



ASSISTANT SECRETARY AT Y. M. C. A. QUILTS TO GO TO CALIFORNIA

W. R. Paske, Former Association Worker in Chicago, to Take His Place.

G. C. Hendricks, assistant secretary of the Great Falls Y. M. C. A. for the past two months, has resigned his position with the organization to go to California, where he may engage in Y. M. C. A. work again. He will leave here Monday by automobile for Los Angeles. Mr. Hendricks has been succeeded by W. R. Paske, who was formerly associated with the Y. M. C. A. in Chicago.

During the war Mr. Hendricks was in the expeditionary forces overseas and after the signing of the armistice was in charge of Y. M. C. A. theaters for the soldiers in the camps. He came here two months ago immediately after his discharge from the overseas work.

His successor was also a member of the expeditionary forces. His previous

Y. M. C. A. experience was largely in Chicago. He is a star basket ball man and will probably have charge of some of the basket ball coaching at the Great Falls "Y", assisting E. E. Holdeman, physical director of the organization. His addition to the staff of the "Y" gives the organization four men, including Mr. Holdeman, who will be able to take charge of athletics.

Will Tell of Memberships Needed After Completion of Budget for Coming Year.

The number of memberships needed by the Y. M. C. A. here in its membership roundup to begin December 1 will soon be announced according to C. C. Davis, chairman of the Y. M. C. A. membership committee.
