21 FIGHTS STAGED IN PHILADELPHIA ON THANKSGIVING DAY

Willie Jackson, Lew Tendler, Gene Tunney and Jack Leslie Are Winners in Bouts.

Philadelphia, Nov. 25.—Willie Jackson, New York; Lew Tendler, Philadelphia; Gene Tunney, light heavyweight champion of the world; E. F. and Jack Leslie, Indianapolis, heavyweight, were victors in Thanksgiving day boxing matches in this city.

Jackson won from Matt Brock, of Cleveland, in the fourth round of a scheduled eight round bout, the referee stopping the fight to save Brock from further punishment.

Tendler easily defeated Johnny Tillman of Minneapolis, in an eight round bout. Tendler led all the way and had Tillman wobbly in the seventh.

Tunney beat Houck, of Lancaster, by a slight margin in a six round fight. Tunney 175 pounds and Houck 173.

OREGON DEFEATED IN PASADENA GAME AFTER HARD FIGHT

University of Southern California Wins Contest 12 to 0 Before Crowd of 25,000 People.

Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 25.—The university of Oregon football team went down to defeat Thursday at the hands of the university of Southern California, playing on tournament field here, but it was a fight to the final whistle.

The score: U. S. C., 12; Oregon 0. It was all earned points, and while most of the game was played in Oregon territory, there was never a moment that the U. S. C. could slaken either defense or onset.

A crowd estimated by the game management at 25,000 persons was gathered under a cloudless sky, in a temperature that militated against Oregon, used to a cooler climate, and a heavier field.

There was small choice in the line strength, neither team being able to gain consistently by smashes, although the Trojans forced the ball through on downs several times. The interference was less evident than the strength of the teams would have led the spectators to expect.

Pug Is Knocked Out by Policeman Sent to Make His Arrest

COURSE IS SHORT, AIR RECORD CLAIM DOESN'T HOLD GOOD

Lieut. C. C. Mosley Flies at Rate of Three Miles a Minute in Pulitzer Race.

Mincola, N. Y., Nov. 25.—Flying at a speed of virtually three miles a minute, Lieut. C. C. Mosley, piloting an American-Made Verville Packard army plane won the first Pulitzer trophy aeronautics race here Thursday against a field of 34 starters. He covered the course of slightly more than 130 miles in 44 minutes and 29 and 57 1-100 seconds, an average speed of approximately 173 miles an hour.

Officials of the Aero Club of America which conducted the race, first having estimated the course at 140 miles in length announced immediately after the race that Mosley's average speed was 188.4 miles an hour, a new world's record. However after carefully re-scaling of the official map showed that laps were slightly more than 32 miles in length, instead of 35, the average speed being cut down ten miles an hour. It is expected that a survey of the course will be made in order that exact computations may be established.

DRIVER AND DEPUTY EXCHANGE SHOTS ON ROAD SOUTH OF CITY

Search for Smith by Sheriff Burns and Deputies Splan, McClinton, Burns and Marion ended when they encountered at the Plaza. He submitted sullenly to arrest, but said nothing. He had no weapon, but this is thought to have been left in the car, which had not been located at 1 o'clock. Smith had a number of revolver shells in his pocket and about \$125, nearly all Canadian currency and silver in his pocket.

J. F. Costello, said to be connected with a messenger company, was arrested and taken to the county jail for investigation after Smith had been located. He is thought to have knowledge of Smith's activities and it is suspected that he has been associated with the man from Canada. Further arrests were expected during the night.
