"HEALTH WEEK" IS UNDER WAY

Sermons and Talks Given on Subject; Pamphlets to Be Distributed.

The "health week" program sponsored by the Rotary club, which started Sunday with special health sermons by the pastors of most of the Great Falls churches, were well under way Monday morning. The first step in the work was the distribution of health pamphlets printed by the Rotary club by the Boy Scouts of the city. Troop 1 of the Boy Scouts which was to have distributed literature Monday did not participate in the work but its plan was taken by Troop 2 which had about 20 boys in the field. The pamphlets circulated Monday was "Eleven Rules for Health." Today (Tuesday) Troop 3 of the Boy Scouts will distribute the Rotary pamphlets "Why Risk Your Baby's Health" and also a pamphlet describing the baby clinic of the Health department in the Stanton Bank building. Four minute speakers, headed by Dr. B. H. MacIntosh of the First Congregational church, addressed the audience in all of the Great Falls theaters Monday night, telling of the plans for the "health week" work. Wednesday noon at the Rotary club luncheon at the Hotel Rainbow, Rotary committee will make reports on the health work in the city. The Rev. Leo L. Totten, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will be the speaker.

WIGGIN OUTFIT LEADS IN POINTS

Rival Camps in Y. M. C. A. Membership Roundup Report Progress in Campaign.

The Powder River camp of the Y. M. C. A. membership roundup, headed by A. E. Wiggins, with 9811 1-4 points, now leads E. E. Givens' Big Horn outfit by 124 1-2 points, according to reports made Monday evening at a meeting of division leaders and team captains at the Y. M. C. A.

The points are counted on the following basis: \$12.50 memberships, five points; \$25 membership, 10 points; \$50 memberships, 25 points; \$100 memberships, 50 points. Twenty-five men representing all the teams of the campaign reported at the Y. M. C. A. meeting Monday night. According to the Y. M. C. A. directors the budget of the association will be trimmed considerably.
