

# DROP OF ONE-FOURTH IN THE FALL WHEAT ACREAGE IN STATE

### Low Prices and High Wages Serve to Greatly Reduce Activities of Farmers.

Helena, Dec. 8.—Montana grain producers have been discouraged to such an extent by the combination of high wages in the summer and low prices for products this fall that the acreage in winter grain crops in Montana this year has dropped about 25 per cent less than the winter grain production of 1919 which was 25 per cent below normal, according to Chas. D. Greenfield, commissioner of agriculture and publicity in his annual report to Governor Sam V. Stewart.

In his report Mr. Greenfield said that the 1920 crop in Montana was the best in the point of production Montana has enjoyed in four years. It was so far superior to the crop of 1919 that it might justly be called a fair year so far as production is concerned for the farmers of the state, he added.

### Wheat Price Discourages

Another unfavorable condition which has resulted in seriously crippling many farmers financially was due to the long, hard winter following the poor hay crop in 1919. It is conservatively estimated that Montana sent out for feed for livestock in the winter of 1919-1920 not less than \$50,000,000. The feed bought was not only poor in quality but the price paid for it was extraordinarily high. Livestock was rushed to the market and the number of sheep and cattle was greatly depleted, with the result that with a bountiful hay crop in 1920 there is not sufficient stock in the state to make a good market.

### Child Is Selected for City Attorney

### CASCADE EPIDEMIC BLAMED DIRECTLY TO ONE HEAD CHEESE

#### Disease Is Termed Paratyphoid—State Epidemiologist Goes to Investigate.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Helena, Dec. 8.—One head cheese is suspected as being the cause of the epidemic from which 33 persons are suffering at the town of Cascade. Efforts of both the state and Cascade county health officers are now directed toward locating the origin of the bacilli which has caused the epidemic. Latest reports are that the epidemic is paratyphoid. Dr. John J. Sippy, state epidemiologist for the state board of health, went to Cascade on Tuesday where he will study the history of these cases and will co-operate with the Cascade county health department and the health officer of the city of Cascade to determine if possible what the malady is. It was at first diagnosed as influenza.

Prior to his departure for Cascade Dr. Sippy said he received messages from the county health board of Cascade that blood tests of patients suffering from the malady show there is an affinity for an organism known as bacillus paratyphoid B. The organism which was identified and segregated was obtained by Dr. Walker, bacteriologist for the Cascade county board of health. Dr. Sippy said all of the cases were mild.

### DEMOCRATS OF BUTTE SELECT DON B. KING FOR MAYORALTY RACE

#### Member of Last and the Coming Legislative Session to Head Labor Forces.

King, member of the house of representatives in the last session of the legislature and representative-elect. Don King is looked upon as one of the best voted getters in Butte. In the recent general election as a candidate for re-election for the legislature against a formidable Republican machine he led the ticket for the Democrats. Butte city naturally is Democratic in the main reason for the city going to the Republicans at the last municipal election being because Dunn was a candidate for mayor, and a large percentage of Democrats went to Stodden in preference to Dunn because the latter represented the radical element. With King the candidate this time Democrats already are predicting an easy victory. Mr. King was born and reared in Butte, and is a graduate of the Butte high school and Butte business college.

### Former Police Chief of Big Copper Camp Dies in California

Butte, Dec. 8.—Word was received Wednesday afternoon that Captain E. W. Wynne, chief of police under Mayor Joseph Corby of Butte, a pioneer of Montana and veteran of the Spanish-American war, had died Tuesday night at the home of his son, Hedman W. Wynne, of Berkeley, Cal., chief forester of the department of northern California. Captain Wynne commanded Company G of the first Montana regiment and had a fine record as an officer having participated in all the campaigns in the Philippines in which his regiment took part. Captain Wynne left Butte six months ago on a visit to his son and daughter living in Berkeley. The funeral will be in Berkeley Thursday.
