Berlin Press Declares Nation Had Hoped for Real Wilsonian Organization to Benefit World, but Asserts Present One Far From That Ideal; Says U. S. Eliminated by Political Reasons.

Berlin, Dec. 12.—All Germany, except the radical Socialists and Communists believes Argentine's withdrawal from the assembly of the league means the beginning of the break-up of the league as now constituted.

Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, says: "Argentina's exodus can most seriously endanger the existence of the league. In Germany, which stands outside the blessing of the Geneva meeting, Argentina's courageous and common sense stand will find a strong echo. It is now proof of the conviction of Germans that the Versailles peace dictation has created untenable circumstances and is beginning to find sympathy and appreciation outside of Germany. The plebiscite in Greece, the collapse of the peace of Sevres, the election results in America and now Argentina's withdrawal are stages on the way to a healthier new order."

It broke in France on the very eve of Armistice day, when the French nation was preparing the simultaneous celebration of victory over Germany and the jubilee of the Third Republic.

375 Koreans Executed; 2 Churches, 5 Schools Burned by Japanese

Tokio, Dec. 12.—Three hundred and seventy-five Koreans were killed or executed in the recent skirmishes near Chang Tao, Korea, according to late advices received from that area, where Korean bandits have been operating for some time. Fifteen hundred Koreans are said to have surrendered, while two churches and five schools were destroyed.

Sugar Dealers Bolt Agreement to Sell Through Committee

New Orleans, December, 12.—Dealers who recently signed an agreement to turn over the control of the marketing of the Louisiana sugar crop to a committee of 19 growers and dealers have notified the committee they would no longer abide by the prices fixed, and that henceforth every dealer would sell his sugar at whatever price he chose.

French Surround Turks at Aintab; Welfare Workers Safe

Constantinople, Dec. 12.—The French have gained a foothold in Aintab, Asiatic Turkey, surrounding the town in the hope of starving out the Turks, who are fighting behind barricades. The fall of the town is expected soon. American workers of the Near East relief are safe.

Landlords Lower Rents; Another Drop Expected

Springfield, Mass., Dec. 12.—Owners of four large Springfield apartment houses have voluntarily announced reductions in rents, and in anticipation of further reductions within the next six months, William F. Grady, president of the Tenants' Protective association, has cautioned members to accept no leases for more than six months.

Australia Lets Go of Wool for Austria

Paris.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—About 2500,000 have been made available by the British government for the shipment of 20,000 bales of wool from Australia to Austria to aid the country in reorganizing its industries. The transaction is being handled by the international committee for relief credits.

New Machine Gun Fires 700 Half-Inch Bullets in Minute

Washington, Dec. 12.—Successful tests of a machine gun firing half inch bullets and with at least double the range of the ordinary .30 machine gun, are in use, was announced Saturday by the war department. The new weapon gives "remarkable results" the statement declared.

Three German Planes Are Held in Vienna

Vienna.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—The international commission of control has refused to release three German airplanes that flew from Munich recently and the commission has ordered the destruction of aviation materials which was to be used in an Austrian air service soon to be established.
