

ELECTRIFICATION OF G. N. AWAITS FLATHEAD PLANT

Development of Power Site by Rocky Mountain Co. to Start.

Helena, Jan. 8.—With development of the power site at the south end of Flathead lake by the Rocky Mountain Power Co., subsidiary of the Montana Power Co., will come electrification in Montana and Idaho of the lines of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific, according to reports received in Helena.

The lease on the power site was obtained some time ago. Officials of the Great Northern were among the pioneers of electrification with their successful installation of the system in the Cascades. It has also long been known that Northern Pacific officials have watched the Milwaukee electrification costs and three times had estimates on the cost of electrifying the road from Whitehall to Butte over the Homestead hill.

The power site which is among the largest in Montana, will provide tremendous horsepower. In addition the Great Northern will draw its power from a hydro-electric plant on the Kootenai river, on which construction work will start in the spring, according to advices received here. The power development is part of the \$300,000,000 reclamation project proposed by Washington state engineers for a huge acreage in the eastern section of the state which will be among the larger irrigation projects of the world.
