WILL FILE A PROTEST.

When the notice for publication is made in the matter of a townsite patent for Bisbee to be issued to the Probate Judge, the committee on incorporation will file a protest with the Land Office officials, praying that the application be denied on the ground that the people of Bisbee, through an incorporated form of government, desire to have the patent issued to the city council and obtain their titles from this source, rather than from the Probate Judge at an increased expense.

The committee appointed on the incorporation of the town are now confident that this desirable state of affairs will soon be accomplished, and will file a protest in the interest of economy to the property holders of Bisbee, and as representing their desires, and as the protest be not issued to the Probate Judge.

That the committee or any citizen will be given the opportunity to file a protest is accorded by the statutes, and it is the duty of the Land Office officials to listen to the protest. A letter has been written to the Land Office officials stating that a protest would in all probability be filed by the committee at the proper time, which will be during the period of the publication of the required notice by the Land Office officials.

The fees to be received by the Probate Judge in contest cases over title to property are not small, and the securing of a townsite patent through the office of the Probate Judge means an expense of several thousand dollars. That it could be accomplished through a city council and mayor at a less expense and unnecessary travel is an undisputed fact. This is a question that deserves serious consideration.

"Assistants" to the district attorney conducted the prosecution in the most important cases, at an extra expense to the county. It is true, but with very satisfactory results.

Willcox Refuses
George B. Willcox of Bisbee, late justice of the peace of this precinct, has been tendered the office of clerk of the district court of Santa Cruz county and the office of court commissioner at Nogales. Judge George R. Davis tendered him the position at Tombstone on Friday.

It is stated by those returning from Tombstone on yesterday's train that Mr. Willcox decided yesterday morning not to accept the position in Santa Cruz county. It is known that Mr. Willcox is an applicant for the same position in this county.

Texas Sugar Factory

Austin, Dec. 21.—Governor Sayers has definitely decided to purchase the Clemens farm of twenty-five hundred acres and in the spring to have erected for the state a big sugar factory to cost over a quarter of a million dollars. Sugar may be offered in competition with the sugar trust. Sayers does not anticipate any trouble with labor unions, as all unions are opposed to the sugar trust and laboring interests will not be affected by convict made sugar.
