

## TRAIN WRECKED ON NACOZARI R R

ENGINE JUMPS THE TRACK FOLLOWED BY TWO CARS.

Politics at Douglas—Democratic Club Organized—Republican Justice of the Peace will Not Make the Race.

A wreck which came near being quite serious occurred Monday morning at Cos on the Nacozari road. Engine No. 100 jumped the track and two cars of coke also left the rails. The engine was brought to a sudden stop in time to save it going over an embankment, a hundred feet below. A special train left Douglas Monday night for the scene of the accident and brought the passengers back to Douglas. The crippled engine will be pulled back to Douglas and put in the company shops and repaired. About forty passengers, mostly Mexicans, were on the train when the accident happened, and did not know what a close call they had until after the train started back for the United States.

Nine traveling men were booked at one of the Douglas hotels Monday of this week. All report Douglas as a good field for their respective lines of business.

J. M. O'Connell, of Bisbee, came down on professional business Tuesday evening.

Politics is all one can hear discussed on the streets and in the homes in Douglas. The knowing ones are already predicting the majority the democrats will have and several large bets have been made on the result of the several different candidates in the field.

The democrats have established their day headquarters at the Colonial hotel and all important meetings are held there of the different committees at work.

Douglas will spring a surprise on the good republicans at the coming election when they find that they have lost the negro vote and the democrats captured it. The colored men have combined and will vote dead against the republicans, on account of what a prominent republican did to one of their race in Douglas a few months ago. The negro in question was advised to leave the town, or he would be lynched after he had been dismissed in Judge Perrin's court on a charge of burglary, but no case was made out against him, and his past character proven to be good. There are about sixteen negroes who will vote next month.

The Douglas democratic club had a rousing meeting in the Workmen hall Saturday evening. The hall was crowded and many were turned away not being able to gain admission. The regular order of business was carried out after which short talks were made to the club by John J. Bowen and James Howell. Both candidates made a favorable impression and the members were very enthusiastic in their reception. The club now has close on to 300 members and is growing very fast. Secretary Nichols says he will make his boast good to have the full number of 400 before election day, and every member will be found working his hardest to elect the full democratic ticket.

George Meek, editor of the International, is the busiest man in precinct No. 8, and is counted on as a sure winner, and Billy Sparks will be the

next constable at Douglas. Mr. C. J. Johnson, the regular republican nominee for Justice of the Peace for this precinct, has sent word to the republican committee that he cannot make the race for the office, as his mining business will take up all his time and that he expects to remain in the east for a month or two longer in the interest of his company. A number of Douglas people have, within the past few days, sent telegraphic orders for Copper Glance stock, and wish to get in on the present block before it is all sold out.

Judging from the number of brick buildings under course of construction in Douglas at the present time, one would certainly believe that the border city will, in a few months, have more substantial buildings than either Tucson or Phoenix.

The dance given under the auspices of the Douglas base ball club Saturday evening was one of the pleasant social events of the season. A large number of Douglas society folk were out and six couples came down from Bisbee to attend the dance. The boys realized a neat sum and will use the money to buy them suits and club material and will soon be in shape to give the Bisbee champions a good run for their money. The team has been greatly strengthened lately by several first class ball tossers from Southern and Western leagues, who will winter in Douglas.

## SHOOTING AT TOMBSTONE

A MINER TAKES A SHOT AT A BARTENDER.

Bullet Passes Through His Left Arm—The Assailant is Arrested by Deputy Sheriff Porter McDonald.

Tombstone was the scene of a shooting scrape yesterday, and as a result Fred Carlata, a saloon man, was shot through the left arm, shattering the bone and rendering him helpless for the time being.

Fred Carlata runs a saloon on Allen street and was behind the bar when a man named Alexander Demorso entered the place and demanded a drink. This was given him and later he demanded another. This request was refused by Carlata. Demorso departed, but a few minutes later entered the rear door and opened fire on the bartender with a six shooter, firing three shots, the third hitting Carlata in the arm. After doing the shooting Demorso walked out of the saloon and down Allen street towards the Arlington hotel. He had not proceeded very far when he was placed under arrest by Deputy Sheriff Porter McDonald and disarmed. He was placed in jail and will have his hearing today before Justice Chas. Wallace.

Alexander Demorso is a miner, who has been working for the Exposed Reef company in the Huachuca mountains. He had been in Tombstone for several days drinking heavily and was under the influence of liquor at the time he did the shooting.
