NEWS FROM THE SMELTER CITY

DOUGLAS POST OFFICE NEEDS MANY COMPLAINTS ARE REGISTERED AGAINST SERVICE

Prominent People Ask for Better Facilities for Handling Heavy Mails—Great Need of Improvement. (Special to Review.) Douglas, March 13.—The many expressions of complaint, coming from prominent business men of the city in regard to the inefficiency of the mail service in Douglas, impelled the Review to look into the matter and to investigate the foundation of these complaints. In every phase of the matter, they seem to be well founded, and we feel it our duty to place the facts before the reading public of Douglas in their true light. To begin with, the Douglas postoffice is, and has been since its institution a fourth-class office. This means that the government employe who acts as postmaster, receives a certain reimbursement for his services and that out of his insignificant pittance, he is expected to pay for any and all assistants or office equipment he may need in the performance of his duties. As we said before, Douglas is an office of the fourth-class, and Douglas has a population (according to the lowest conservative estimates) of 3,500. On the other hand, Naco, our border sister, while behind us in respect to numbers and growth, is an office of the third-class and the postmaster at that point is allowed an assistant in the handling of the mails, said assistant being paid by the United States government. While we do not wish to convey the impression that we are reviling the Douglas postoffice or its head, Mr. Renwick White, we do want it understood that we are expressing the wishes of the entire community when we state that the present office is inadequate to handle, with dispatch, the large amount of mail matter now passing through its hands, and something should be done, and that at once, to remedy and improve the existing conditions. The postoffice itself is as good as could be expected of a fourth-class office, but Douglas has passed the point in her life when she needs something better from the government than a fourth-class office. There is enough business being done right now to warrant Douglas in having a building entirely devoted to the handling of mail. The present office is so congested that papers have to be laid aside on tables for want of rack space in which to place them for window delivery. As to lock boxes, the procuring of one is sure to entail a delay of from a week to a month and all because the government is slow to investigate our standing with a view to enlarging the postoffice quarters here and advancing us to the rate of a second-class office. Douglas is not a fourth rate in any respect, but a top-notch of the first water. The people of Douglas have waited patiently for recognition in this matter and the time is now ripe for action. Let the people arise and justly claim their due, petition the proper authorities and demand recognition in their cry for a postoffice and mail train service which will be adequate to fill not only our present, but meet the demands of our greater future. Let the authorities at Washington send a representative to our midst and see for himself that our growth is not of the mushroom variety, but a growth, the stability of which is unquestioned. Douglas is "founded on a rock," and it cannot fall though "Croakers" croak, and "pikers" pike, for the men of brains and business ability who represent the flower of our community have looked well into the future before making a single step toward the advancement of Douglas. There is every indication to believe that we are situated at the gateway to the richest mineral deposits of our sister republic, which fact speaks well of Douglas as a future railway center. We will be the residential center of Cochise county, if not the seat of a newer county and in view of all these possibilities, we at least deserve to be "seen" in the matter of our wants, our absolute necessities.

Drop into any insignificant side track burg and you will find a fourth-class office; drop into Douglas, with its crowded streets, model buildings and metropolitan business houses and you find the same little fourth-class postoffice in lieu of a federal building in keeping with our other structures. It is high time that the citizens take up the matter and push it to a conclusion at the earliest possible date. The opinions of a few of our business men may serve to corroborate our statements in regard to the condition of affairs. E. O. Ellis, cashier of the Bank of Douglas, when asked for an expression of opinion as to whether or not he was in favor of a better mail service, showed the writer two letters postmarked El Paso, Tex. March 10, 1903, 7:30 p. m. It was then 11:15 a. m. of the 13th and Mr. Ellis was leaving the postoffice with his morning mail, two days later than the train from El Paso which should have brought those letters. Mr. Ellis expressed himself as not only favoring the advancement of Douglas' classification to the third-
