## NACAZARI ROAD IS BEING RUSHED

BUT GRADE NOT YET READY FOR LAYING OF RAILS.

Bashful Amazons Bring Domestic Dispute Into Court—Unfounded Report That Chinamen Were Hiding Here.  
(Special to Review.)

Douglas, July 15.—Colonel Griffen, of Orman & Crook, returned yesterday from Cos and Nacozari, where he went to see about the extension of the Nacozari road. He said that the work was progressing rapidly. There are now six camps, and between 500 and 600 men are employed in the various camps. At present Colonel Griffen could not state just when the grade would be ready for the steel to be laid. As to the labor question, Colonel Griffen stated that the reported scarcity of labor was somewhat exaggerated. The labor market in this particular section of Sonora is not overflowing, but there are lots of idle men in other parts of Mexico who are beginning to come to this section for work, and Mexicans from Chihuahua are being brought in, and prove to be better workers in many ways than the Sonora laborers.

There was a civil suit today in the court of Justice Johnson which packed the court room and crowded the sidewalk in front. Two of the black bellies from a Sixth street joint had a difference over room rent and brought the case to court for the justice to decide who was right. As yet no decision has been rendered. Those who heard the evidence said that the case furnished as good a show as a nigger minstrel.

This morning it was reported that a number of Chinamen were in hiding near Douglas. Inspector Connell was informed that the Chinamen were under the stock pens. Connell investigated, but up to date has not located a pig-stick in this vicinity. The whole surrounding country will be searched, and if the Chinamen are here they will be caught before tomorrow.

## ELECTRIC LIGHTS NOW AT DOUGLAS

THE FIRST CURRENT TURNED ON WITH SUCCESSFUL RESULTS.

Border City of Marvels to Have System of Lights Which Will Rival Those of Larger Cities of Coast.  
(Special to Review.)

Douglas, July 15.—Last night the first electric lights that have ever burned in Douglas were turned on in the power house of the Douglas Improvement company. Two small generators were belted to the engine and started, and the engine room at the power plant was lighted by electricity.

Tonight the poles for the town circuit will be here, and as soon as possible will be set up and wired. The dynamo is on the road, and is expected to arrive any day. The engine which will run the generators is a tandem compound, which will be run at 240 revolutions, developing 160 horse power.

The engine and dynamo will start at full load as many people have signed for electric lights in their homes and business houses.

Another engine and dynamo has been ordered, and the boiler capacity will be increased, making the Douglas electric and ice plant one of the most complete in the country.
