ARIZONAN ARRIVES IN MICHIGAN

F. M. HILL, OF THE COPPER QUEEN STORE, TELLS OF OUR RAPID PROGRESS.

Newspaper Reporters Were Disappointed Because He Did Not Wear a Sombrero, and His Spurs Did Not Jingle.

F. M. Hill, furniture buyer for the Copper Queen store, is back from Grand Rapids, Mich., where he bought a large and complete assortment of furniture which will be placed in the company's stores at Bisbee and Douglas.

While in Grand Rapids Mr. Hill was interviewed by several newspapers on the conditions in Arizona, and we take the following extracts from the Daily Furniture Record of that city:

"F. M. Hill, buyer for the big department stores of the Copper Queen Consolidated Mining Company of Arizona, is in the furniture market minus sombrero, buckskin breeches, a belt full of guns, knives and cartridges and in fact everything which the average mind associates with the territory of Arizona and its inhabitants.

"Although this is the first visit Mr. Hill has made to the Grand Rapids furniture market, the city of Bisbee, whence he hails, is no stranger to Grand Rapids furniture. The fine new Copper Queen hotel of that city is fitted out wholly with Grand Rapids made furniture, Mr. French, assistant superintendent of the company, having visited this city to select it.

"Business has been booming with us," said Mr. Hill yesterday. "We know nothing but prosperity in the copper country of the southwest and the march of business is all the time upward and onward. The Copper Queen mine is the fourth largest copper mine in the world in point of output. It employs 2000 men, working three shifts of eight hours each; they are paid \$3.50 a day and that without a union of any sort among them. We do not know of such a thing as a strike.

"The prosperity of the copper districts of Arizona seems to be assured for many years to come. The Copper Queen mine has been open twenty years and new leads of wonderful richness are being discovered all the time. In those twenty years the mine has been put down 900 feet, but we have 200 miles of track in it to bring out the ore. The company is very much interested in the building up of Arizona and, only recently gave the city a large sum of money for the purpose of building a gymnasium.

"Michigan people are becoming much interested in Arizona copper mines, the owners of the Hecla and Calumet mines having come there and paid big sums for undeveloped mines and great expanses of country which show copper conditions. In the opinion of mining experts Arizona and Warren district will be the greatest copper regions in the world as soon as the mines are developed."

RAILROAD PROSPEROUS.

E. P. & S. W. Pay Roll Shows Steady Growth in All Departments.

The following, taken from the El Paso News, is the substance of an interview had with Paymaster Rous, of the El Paso & Northwestern railroad, and is a general statement of the prosperity of that road:

James C. Rous, Jr., the general paymaster of the E. P. & S. W. railroad, went to Jeffersonville, Indiana, this morning.

Mr. Rous has recently returned from Douglas, where he has become interested in property.

In speaking of the general business of the E. P. & S. W. railroad, Mr. Rous said: "The business of this road forges ahead. The pay roll upon this trip is easily \$45,000. The several departments continue to grow, and with the steady increase of the business of the road the forces are enlarged at Douglas. The pay roll will naturally increase as the business increases. The volume of business is growing rapidly in every department."

ARIZONA LAND WITHDRAWN.

Tonto Basin Scheme Will Not Be So Big as Was Intended.


Washington, July 22.—The commissioner of the general land office today directed the withdrawal from entry of 268,000 acres of land in Arizona, under the reclamation act, in connection with the Salt river irrigation project. The land is partly in the Tucson and partly in the Prescott district. The commissioner has also directed the withdrawal of 180,000 acres in the Roswell, New Mexico, district, for addition to the Lincoln forest reserve.
