Washington, Sept. 7.—The state department today received a routine message from Beupre, the American minister at Bogota, acknowledging the receipt of Secretary Hay's cable of August 26, stating that the Washington government would enter into no engagement which would hamper the president's freedom of action.

His Theme Good Citizenship and the Relation of Capital and Labor to the State.
