## NEW COLLECTOR FOR AGUA PRIETA HAS STARTED REFORM IN THE MEXICAN PORT.

Has Already Recommended That an Inspector Be Appointed to Officiate in the Free Zone.

(Special to Review.) Douglas, Sept. 23.—The new deputy collector at Agua Prieta has taken hold of his office in the Mexican custom house across the line, and will begin working on several reforms needed there.

One of the first things the new deputy has recommended to the Mexican government is the appointment of an inspector at the Santa Rosa mine, which would be the saving of a large amount of money to the company and other companies operating in the free zone. The object of the inspector is to see that all goods shipped into the free zone and entered as such is not sent out of this zone, but consumed within the 20 leagues designated by the government. It is hoped that the recommendation will meet with the approval of the officials at the City of Mexico.

### LITTLE DOUGLAS LOCALS.

A. L. Manahan, manager of the Bisbee Opera House, passed through Douglas this morning en route to El Paso, where he goes to bring back the Olympia Opera company.

Mr. Manahan is trying to stop over in Douglas and give several nights of grand opera here. The company is one of the finest on the road this year and would be a treat to Douglas people if dates could be secured for this town.

W. F. Crane, general auditor of the Phelps-Dodge company, is in Douglas on business.

Ed Rouzer, the popular of the Copper Queen in Bisbee, came down this morning.

Joy passed through Douglas today en route to the Chiricahua on mining business.

Two miles of new track is being laid in the E. P. & S. W. yards near the passenger depot. A track scale has been put in on the new switch, and will greatly facilitate the work of weighing cars in the yards here.

F. A. Heldberg, a prominent mining man of Bisbee, passed through Douglas yesterday from a trip in the Chiricahua.

W. A. Felge went to Bisbee last night on business.

E. A. Jones, of Fritchard & Jones, of Bisbee, returned to the big copper camp last night after several days visit in Douglas on business.

C. T. Mead, a large cattleman of California, who is associated with Wm. Short in the Caballona, Sonora, is in Douglas on business connected with his cattle interests.

Lee Benton, manager of the El Tigre Mining company, is in Douglas buying supplies for his camp.

A special train carrying Professor Douglas, Miss Douglas and Thomas C. A. Brown went to Bisbee this morning. The train consisted of coach II and engine 15. Engineer Frank Armstrong was in the cab and Tom Durcell was conductor.

George and James Reay have purchased an interest in the livery business on Thirteenth street. The business will be under charge of Mr. James Reay former superintendent of the Pavo Rico mine. Mr. Reay is well known in the Southwest, and will receive a good share of the patronage of the people of Douglas.

A number of Douglas people are contemplating visiting El Paso on the 8th of October to take in the circus, and several merchants expect to go down and buy a supply of goods for their stores here. The low rate put on by the railroad is a strong inducement to get people to spend a day in the Pass City.

Twenty men are now employed in leveling off the roadway to the Santa Rosa mine from the railroad crossing at kilometer 19, on the Nacozari R. R. When finished the road will have an easy grade and will be a great help to the camp.

Twenty-two carloads of coke are now being unloaded on the elevated track of the Copper Queen near the reduction works. This is the second shipment of coke received at the smelters thus far.

J. D. Seltz, E. A. Street and A. L. Harron, stockholders in the El Tigre mine, left for the property over the Nacozari R. R. this morning.

A. C. Labbert has been appointed forwarding agent in the custom house on the Mexican side for the Santa Rosa Mining company.

## DOUGLAS ROUTE IS THE BEST

HARGROVE RETURNS FROM TRIP TO SAHUARIPA DISTRICT.

Says Many People Who Go Into the New Section Take Hermosillo Trail, Which is Longer Than Via Douglas.

(Special to Review.) Douglas, Sept. 23.—Major W. L. Hargrove, secretary of the El Tigre Mining company, returned to Douglas yesterday from an extended trip into the Sahuaripa mining section. He was well pleased with the new section visited, and speaks in high terms of the bright prospects of this country. He states that a large number of prospectors and supplies are going into the new country by the way of Hermosillo and taking the mountain trail. It is much longer than by way of Douglas, and he states that if something was done here to show the people the advantage in taking the Douglas route it would result in much good for the smelter city.

### TOMBSTONE LOCAL NEWS.

Petroleum arriving in Tombstone (Prospector.) From two to three carloads of crude daily for the Consolidated Mines, that being the fuel mostly used by the company.

John Sandveit, who was brought to this city a few days ago from Cananea, suffering from an attack of fever, died last night. He will be buried tomorrow.

Allen R. English returned from Cananea, last evening, where he has been for the past week on business connected with the Guadalupe Mining company.

B. F. Taylor, the Gleason merchant, was in the city last evening returning home this morning. He reports that camp as being quiet at the present time. The shipments of ore from there has been stopped temporarily but he stated that they would be resumed in the course of a few weeks.

W. L. Johnson and S. S. Badger of the Benton company returned from Tucson last evening where they went on business connected with that company. The businessmen are engaged in looking up the Little Devil mining property here, and are making excellent progress. They expect soon to commence shipping ore to the El Paso smelter. They have a number of tons now on the dump ready for shipment. Captain Kelton, of Tucson, is also interested in this property.

SETTLING THEIR DIFFICULTIES. Congressman Wilson will leave tonight for Prescott. He stated this afternoon that he had information to the effect that the miners and operators of Yavapai county were rapidly settling their differences and that many of the miners were returning to work.—Phoenix Enterprise.

## OFFICERS FIGHT BOLD ROBBERS

NACO, SONORA, SCENE OF PITCHED BATTLE.

Officer Shot Twice, But Will Recover. Stolen Goods Found in Suspect's House—He May Betray Pals.

(Special to Review.) Naco, Sonora, Sept. 23.—Monday night about 1 o'clock Naco, Sonora, was awakened by the sound of a number of pistol shots proceeding from the Casino Saloon.

The place is kept by one Ernesto Taix, who was the victim of a daring robbery, in which four Mexicans participated.

It appears that these men got away with ten dollars with comparative ease, and hoped that "mas dinero" might be obtained, returned to the raid.

In the meantime the Mexican officials had been notified, and two police were on hand. A pitched battle ensued, the outcome of which was uncertain for a time.

One officer was slightly bruised and beaten, another received two bullets in his anatomy, but his case is not considered serious. Under cover of the darkness all four of the robbers got away.

The comisario went to work on the case, and as a result an arrest on suspicion was made. This arrest is considered fruitful. In the suspect's house search revealed some forty pairs of wooden pants and seven suits of clothing secreted in two boxes and a trunk.

These articles were stolen from the Copper Queen store and Southwestern Commercial company some days previous.

The comisario is now confident that the perpetrators of both acts are the four men in question.

The suspect is lodged in jail and is not allowed to communicate with anyone, as it is believed that he can give information that will lead to the arrest of other guilty parties.

It is conceded by the officials that the other three have made good their escape to either Bisbee or Douglas, and this is all they will at present make public.
