Five Mexican outlaws, well known to residents of the Boacachi district, rode into the town one night recently, whooping and yelling and discharging their six-shooters at a lively rate. They held up the only store in the village and fired several shots at the proprietor, one of which took effect, striking their victim in the shoulder and wounding him seriously.

As soon as they had completed their work of holding up the town, they started out in a northerly direction and it is thought that they were making for the United States.

We will ship about 12 head to Phoenix, and about 2,000 head of cattle to Fresno county, California. These lots will be all shipped from Naco. On arrival at Phoenix and California they will be further fattened and then sold for beef. They will require but very little feeding, as the cattle we have are in the pink of condition on the range." "No, sir; there are not as many cattle now in Arizona as there has been in years past, but there are more than there has been for the past few years. The demand continues good, and prices are very satisfactory. These shipments will make first are from the Turkey Track Cattle company's lot."

MEXICAN CONSUL HERE

GAVITO TELLS ONE FEATURE OF THE NACO KILLING.

Robinson Started Out With the Intention of Doing Up a Mexican Policeman, and Was Deported. May Gavito, the well known vice consul of Mexico, was in the city yesterday from Naco. He reports the town gradually picking up, and Bisbee can well rejoice with Naco in the new stimulus that has been received through the efforts of the El Paso and Southwestern, in putting the border town on the main line. J. R. Gavito when questioned as to the shooting by Ranger Brooks, stated that one incident of the affair occurred on the Mexican side. An official felt the absolute necessity of obtaining a pistol and making the man Robinson feel the majesty of the law.

He stopped the negro on the Mexican side, informing him that he, the Mexican, was an official and placed Robinson under arrest. After this preliminary he took the negro's piece of artillery, namely, a sixshooter, from him, and then magnanimously told him that he might escape arrest if he would make tracks for the American side.

WILCOX FIRM WILL PAY DEBITS

ASSETS OF McCOURT AND GETTIS ARE SUFFICIENT.

Liabilities Are Over \$30,000, While the Assets Will Reach a Figure in Excess of \$36,000.

(Special to Review.) Tombstone, Nov. 3.—Recent advices received here in regard to the failure of the firm of McCourt and Gettis at Wilcox are to the effect that the number of unsecured creditors is much larger than was first supposed, and it will affect many business men from the East as well as many California firms. There are said to be in all over 100 unsecured creditors. The largest creditor is the Arizona National Bank, to which they are indebted \$4,500. Indebtedness to Los Angeles firms aggregates \$8,508, while the total indebtedness will reach in the neighborhood of \$30,000. Four thousand dollars of this is secured by a mortgage on real estate. The total assets are estimated at \$36,000. It is quite probable that all of the creditors will be paid dollar for dollar.
