 can not deliver here under fifteen min-
 utes the way traffic is now running.

**Printy Is Out
 On \$1500 Bonds**

MATTER OF COUNTER CHARGE IS
 UP TO HIS ATTORNEYS.

Assault With Deadly Weapon Is the
 Felony Charge Against Him—Puts a
 New Light on the Case—Hearing
 This Morning.

J. E. Printy, arrested yesterday
 morning charged with felonious as-
 sault with a deadly weapon, was re-
 leased from custody last evening un-
 der \$1,500 bond to appear in Judge
 Brown's court this morning for his pre-
 liminary hearing.

The charge was brought by George
 Childester at the request of John M.
 Johnson. The latter is now able to
 be up and about his house, and will
 probably be able to get down town
 today, his physicians said last night,
 though it is doubtful.

The charge brought by Mr. Child-
 ester puts a new phase on the case, inas-
 much as it avers an assault with a
 deadly weapon. Last Wednesday night,
 when the trouble occurred between
 Johnson and Printy to which the present
 charge is due, and up to the time of
 filing of the charge yesterday, there
 was no hint that Printy had not used,
 as he claimed, his naked fist in bring-
 ing about the extreme embarrassment
 suffered by the face of Johnson. It is
 expected that the hearing this morn-
 ing will attract a large crowd. Mr.
 Printy said last night that he propos-
 ed to fight the case to a finish, but did
 not say whether he proposed to file a
 counter charge against Johnson. This
 matter, he said, together with conduct
 of the present case, is up to his attor-
 neys.

 good deal of soft track to be dealt
 with, but nothing serious now on hand.

**Bisbee's Nine
 Had Hard Luck**

SERIOUS ACCIDENT TO CATCHER
 HAD AT CLIFTON.

And Strong Players Who Could Not
 Get Away to Go on Trip, Put Ball
 Team at Disadvantage—Lost When
 Things Looked Good.

Catcher Dinsmore, of the Bisbee ball
 team, stopped a ball in the first game
 at Clifton Sunday at the expense of a
 two-inch split in his right hand upward
 from the last two fingers on the mem-
 ber. The exceedingly painful injury
 bled profusely, and put the catcher
 permanently out of the game. This
 was in the fourth inning of the first
 game, when the score stood 0 to 0,
 and things looked so bright for a win-
 ning by the home team that there did
 not seem any way out of it. The ac-
 cident to Dinsmore, however, put
 things going wrong, and the Clifton
 players managed to make good.

In the second game everything was
 moving along nicely, with Brubacher,
 of Morend, in the catcher's box. In
 the 6th inning, when the score stood
 4 to 2 in favor of Bisbee, Brubacher,
 in an excess of confidence, suddenly let
 a ball drop. It got away from him
 and let in three Clifton on bases who
 would otherwise never have landed
 home. The incident led to worse er-
 rors, and sent the Bisbee players in
 the air.

Had the home team had its full com-
 plement of regular players it would, as
 matters now appear, have certainly
 brought home a winning in both the
 games played. But Bisbee was short
 four of its best players, these having
 been unable to secure release from the
 positions they hold long enough to
 make the trip. Under the circum-
 stances the boys made an excellent
 showing, all things considered, and de-
 serve encouragement. Next Sunday,
 with all hands on deck, they will make
 a showing in the game with Douglas
 that will redeem the whole business,"
 says Manager Moores.
