RAIN AND SNOW STORM

PRECIPITATION IN LOCAL COUNTRY YESTERDAY WAS HEAVY. MUCH GOOD LIKELY.

Cattlemen Feel That They Are Now Assured of Best Season in Years. Apprehension About What the Gila May Do.

The rain storm which set in yesterday morning and continued through the day and night resulted in precipitation of nearly two inches of life giving wetness for the country about the city.

Cattlemen said last night that the rain assured a splendid season. The fall came gently during most of the day, giving the water opportunity to soak far down into the ground and thoroughly moisten it, beside leaving a store that will aid grass about the roots for months to come.

In the Huachuca and Chiricahua considerable snow is said to have fallen, and it is expected that streams from these mountains will be well filled with water from now on for some time. The San Pedro was rising yesterday, and it is probable that it will get well up in its banks during the next few days.

At Benson and along the S. P. to Tucson heavy rain was had all day yesterday, a cold wind accompanying and threatening to bring snow. Douglas also had a good rain, and reports from El Paso show that the storm extended to and beyond that point. In New Mexico there were heavy falls of both rain and snow, and some apprehension is felt lest the Gila may go on another rampage as bad if not worse than that of last month, when it did much damage along its course.

Arbor Day—After the generous soaking the ground got yesterday the Southwest is in good shape to properly observe Arbor Day. The latter falls on today, and is a Territorial holiday. Banks of city will close because of it. There is no other observation arranged for the occasion in this city so far as announced.

PAIR OF BAD ACTORS

DARBY AND KELTY ARE SO SIZED UP BY THE COURT YESTERDAY.

Officers Expect That Before Jail Sentences the Petty Thieves Are Serving Expire They Will Have Heard of More Serious Charges.

Phil Darby, the jail breaker arrested with John Kelly for petty thieving in the city, got a six months sentence yesterday for jail breaking, and on top of that a ninety-day sentence for contempt of court, accomplished through the direction of uncalculated criticisms upon the court of Judge McDonald because of the six months' sentence passed by the judge.

Darby was heard Wednesday afternoon on a charge of petty stealing. Judge McDonald took the case under advisement until yesterday morning, when he discharged the man. He was immediately rearrested to face a charge of jail breaking, found guilty and given six months. It was then that his tongue got him ninety days more. Darby and Kelly are both bad actors, and undoubtedly have bad records behind them. It is the expectation of the officers that before the sentences the men are serving are expired word for their arrest will have arrived from other quarters.

EDITOR SEMPLE DENIES

That Mr. Allen Has Closed for Miner. Property Not Off the Market, However.

No statement appearing in the Miner of last evening regarding the assertion of Mr. Allen at Las Vegas that he had arranged to purchase the Bisbee evening paper, as told in a dispatch yesterday morning from Las Vegas, a Review reporter last night interviewed Editor Semple regarding the truth of the report.

"There has been no arrangement entered into up to this time between Mr. Allen and myself regarding disposition of the Miner," said Mr. Semple. "I do not say that there may not be a sale made of the property. It is not a priceless possession. If a buyer should appear tomorrow with the money in hand to pay the price for the paper at which it is held, it would be sold. Such course would be business, and nothing more."
