REFUSED TO PAY TAX JOB FOR THE RANGERS

BATES, COLORED, CAME INTO PROMINENCE.

Negro Grew Impudent, and Assessor Gave Him a Pointer—Coon Then Tried Another Game, and is Now in Jail.

George Bates, a negro bootblack of Douglas, was taken from jail at Tombstone last evening to Douglas, where he will be arraigned today on a charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses preferred by Assessor O'Reilly. Bates became impudent when the assessor approached him on Monday at Douglas for his school tax, refusing to pay. The assessor thereupon attached a loud coat and vest owned by the negro. Later the fellow offered to pay the tax if given back his property. The assessor readily agreed, and passed a tax receipt to the negro along with the clothing. Bates put on the clothes and defied the assessor to take them or to recover the tax receipt. Mr. O'Reilly promptly filed a charge against Bates. Before the resultant warrant was served Bates took counsel and fled the town. He was caught at Naco and taken to jail at Tombstone on Tuesday.

STABBING AFFRAY IN WHICH A WOMAN AND A BOY ARE CUT.

Brings to Attention a Retreat of Mexican Desperados Six Miles Out of the City in Dixie Canyon—Bad Lay-out.

Word reached the city yesterday of a stabbing affray in Dixie Canyon, about six miles out of the city on the Tombstone road. A woman was severely cut and a boy 18 years old slightly injured. The knife user was a Mexican named Morales. The woman injured was his wife and the boy his son. As near as can be learned the cutting was the outcome of a drunken debauch that had been in progress in the canyon, where a number of Mexicans have a wood and charcoal camp. The latter is said to be the retreat of desperados and bad Mexicans in general who get into trouble in this city, Douglas and Sonora, the canyon being a wild piece of country well adapted to the hiding of outlaws. Lately there are said to have been a number of horses and new saddles seen at the camp, different parties of Mexicans bringing them in. The fact that there have recently been a number of saddle and horse thefts in and about Cananea may explain the surplus at the Dixie Canyon camp. The occupants of the latter are considered a dangerous gang, and the section is given a clear berth by people traveling that way. It was suggested yesterday when the news of the stabbing was brought in that the Rangers were the people who should proceed to the scene, and while there make a general round up of bad citizens.

TRAIN 63 HOURS LATE.

Heap Much Snow and Cold, Says Mr. Harrington, in the East.

F. R. Harrington returned to the city last evening from a trip to his former home in Michigan. Throughout the Middle West, he states, wintry blasts with snow and ice prevail on all sides. The blizzard generally prevailing is about as strenuous as it will could be. Mr. Harrington came over the Rock Island from Chicago. The train he reached El Paso on yesterday was 63 hours late on reaching its destination. Although the delay on the road was annoying it occasioned passengers no other hardship. All lines from the East have been suffering similar delays during the last week.

Owing to the new morning service which brings fast freight in from El Paso the change from the system inaugurated in order to give Bisbee merchants early morning opportunities at their freight is not noticed. The railroad people find the elimination of the night shift altogether agreeable.
