WANT PAVED STREETS.

Present Plethora of Mud Causes Renewed Clamor for Improvement.

The recent mud laden thoroughfares have aroused renewed clamor in the city for asphalt pavements on Main and Brewery streets. It is understood that the matter will be brought forcibly before the next meeting of the Council with the end in view of getting early action.

The Council is favorable to paving, and has taken steps in that direction through calls for the establishment of grades. Delay has been occasioned, however, by the fact that the office of the city engineer has been so crowded with other work that he has as yet been unable to get to the street task. The principal demand at the present time for paving of the streets comes from business houses of the city, which suffer heavy shrinkage in trade every time rain puts the thoroughfares in the present almost impassable condition.
