FROM ALL OVER THE COUNTRY

APPLICATIONS CAME FOR BISBEE SCHOOL POSITIONS FROM 26 STATES.

Evidence of the Wide Reputation of the City as a Great Mining Camp. One Applicant Offered Bribe.

Appointments of teachers for Bisbee schools during the next school year were made public yesterday by Secretary Wallace of the school board. The new list reads as follows: Misses Kelley, 5th school principal; Devoe, of Ypsilanti, Mich., who will be general instructor in drawing in all the schools; Wilmer, of Windsor, N. J.; Edwards, Kindred, Stewart, Stagner, of Madison, Wis.; Lewis, of Piper City, Ill.; Wright, Harman, of Warrensburg, Mo.; Barber, of Gardner, Ill.; Harley, of Tombstone, Glasgow, of Nebraska; Henry, of California; Harman, also of Warrensburg, Mo.; Bailey, of Colorado; Hosmer, of California; Patterson, of Texas. The appended five are engaged subject to the call of Prof. Phillips, on the completion of the new school building, about November 20th: Misses Duffy, of DeKalb, Ill., who comes as a training teacher in primary work; Thomas, of Yuma; Finnity, Black, of Flagstaff; Freehand, of Fort Thomas, Prof. Krimbill will have charge of the music in the schools of this city as well as in the Douglas schools.

Above 200 applications were received from teachers desirous of positions here, signifying the wide reputation of the city as a great mining camp. The applications came from every part of the country. The larger number were from Arizona. Illinois furnished the second largest number and Minnesota the third. Last year Arizona was first and Michigan second in the number of applications. In the list of applications this year twenty-eight states and territories were represented, strung from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Only one applicant departed from the beaten path in any startling manner. This one offered the clerk a bonus of \$10 in the event of appointment.

BURNED TRESTLE DELAYED
 Trains of E. P. & S. W. Yesterday Afternoon—Will Run on Time Today.

A forty-foot trestle which burned out near Lewis Springs yesterday delayed all afternoon trains. The latter were gotten across on a temporary structure about 7 o'clock, and will be operating on time today.

The trestle is supposed to have caught fire from coals dropped by an engine. Train No. 4, from Benson, due here at 5:35, was the first to be delayed by the fire. First orders were to transfer, and the stub train was sent out from this city to go to the burned trestle. The stub was stopped at Naco, it having been learned by that time that temporary work would be quickly finished. Train No. 4, after crossing, ran straight through to Douglas, its traffic being brought here from Osborne by the stub. The train west from El Paso crossed on the temporary structure and made Benson about two hours late. Passengers from Benson and way points reached here at 9:30. El Paso passengers got away at 8:05.

JURY FAILED TO AGREE.
 Eight Stood for Acquittal of Glenn. Latter Dismissed by Court.

George Glenn, charged with theft of a hat from the Copper Queen store, was dismissed from custody by Justice Murphy yesterday following failure of the jury that heard the case to reach an agreement. Eight stood for acquittal and four for conviction. All the testimony introduced was of circumstantial character, and although some of it was very strong, the jurors who stood out did not think that it warranted them in making a conviction. The one eye witness, having left the city on a business call the day the charge was filed against Glenn.

DETERMINED OPPOSITION TO CUT RATES

BARBERS TAKE A HAND TO PREVENT ANOTHER 15-CENT SHOP.

Defeated in First Round in the Court of Justice Murphy Yesterday Afternoon—Arbourn Given Damages and Room Restored.

The fight on cut rate barber and beer shops in the city is waxing pretty warm, if feeling evidenced in the court of Justice Murphy yesterday afternoon may be taken as a criterion. The display came about through the suit of Arbourn vs. Vellacott. The latter occupies the recently remodeled business block adjoining the Wave on Brewery. After he had made lease of the building he sublet a portion to Arbourn, signing a written contract for a term of one year at \$50 per month. The contract contained no other stipulations, being a model of brevity. It acknowledged the payment of \$10 down on the first month's rent, which was to have commenced on the 8th. After paying the \$10 Arbourn placed barber shop fixtures in the portion of the building he had rented and prepared to open up for business. Other barbers in the city at this time heard of the intention of Arbourn to open another 15-cent shop. A committee went to see Vellacott about it, but that gentleman had the fixtures of Arbourn put in the street during his absence. When Arbourn returned he was refused admission to the room he had contracted for, and was told that the contract was off. Arbourn consulted attorneys and showed his contract with Vellacott. Suit was thereupon filed against Vellacott, who was charged with forcible detainer. A jury was asked for in the hearing yesterday afternoon and granted. It brought in verdict for Arbourn, and allowed him damages to the extent of \$50, as well as finding that his contract entitled him to possession of the room he had rented. The court ordered in accord. Vellacott's attorney then gave notice of appeal, and it is understood that the case will be fought to a finish. Arbourn is a relative of one of the proprietors of the 5-cent beer saloon on Brewery, opposition to the conduct of which has been pronounced among saloon keepers of the city. The 5-cent saloon people declare they are making money, and that they intend to stay in business. They assert that two other saloons in town will shortly join them in rate cutting.

MEXICANS ARRESTED IN TUNNEL
 Stolen Overcoat Found With Them. Man Who Informed on Crowd Is Missing.

A man known about town as a dope fiend yesterday morning at an early hour reported that he had found an overcoat in a tunnel facing on the road between here and Bisbee. He said there was a gang of Mexican hobos in the tunnel, and that he believed they had stolen the overcoat, which was recently lost by a Lowell man. The latter was in the city, and with Officers Wilmoth and Thomas, who summoned Constable Humm, of Lowell, by telephone, went to the tunnel. Four Mexicans were there placed under arrest and brought to jail in this city. The overcoat was identified by the Lowell man as his property. While the arrests were being made the man who informed on the Mexicans disappeared.

GEORGE NELSON IMPROVING.
 Sight of Eye Will Be Saved—Confirmation of Stock Gift Report.

Word from George Nelson, injured three months ago at the L. S. & P. by an explosion of caps, confirms the hope of his friends that his eyesight is being gradually restored. It is also now made known as a certainty that Mr. Nelson's future comfort and freedom from financial anxiety are assured through a presentation of C. & A. stock made to him by the management of the company.

PLANS FOR DECORATION DAY OBSERVATION

ARE COMING TO A HEAD IN MOST SATISFACTORY MANNER.

Indicated That General Holiday Will Be Observed in the City—Mines Will Probably Close—Union Memorial Sunday Service by Churches.

It has been decided to hold a union memorial Sunday service at the Presbyterian Church Sunday evening, May 28th, under the direction of Rev. Fry, pastor. Rev. J. A. Smith will preach the sermon on the evening, and all pastors of the city are to be assigned parts in the service in addition to the regular sermon. Music for the occasion will be furnished by the church choir, and the church will be decorated by the church committee.

All of the committees appointed to look after the several departments that make up the program for decoration day observation report success.

The finance committee's report was especially encouraging, and it is hoped that by the next meeting, Tuesday, the 23rd, that an amount large enough to cover the expenses will be raised. The railroad company will be asked to make low excursion rates into Bisbee on May 30th, and we hope to have a large crowd from Douglas and other points.

Rev. Smith has been appointed chairman of the committee to have charge of the services at the graves on Memorial day. Reports indicate that the Copper Queen Mine will be closed down on the 30th, and the Calumet & Arizona people have advised that their Irish Mag shaft would also be closed that day. Altogether the indications are that Memorial Day in Bisbee will be a genuine holiday, and all are invited by those in charge of the plans to turn out and help the old soldiers and their friends.
