PETITION CIRCULATED ENDORSING FINNERTY

NUMEROUSLY SIGNED DOCUMENT FROM LOWELL AND DON LUIS WILL BE PRESENTED TO SHERIFF HUNT.

Petition States That Deputy Sheriff Finnerty is Acceptable to Majority of Citizens in That Locality Who Request His Retention in Capacity of Peace Officer.

Sheriff Stewart Hunt is expected to arrive this morning, coming over to receive Mrs. Henry Sauvage and Amos Stone, who have been committed to his care and keeping until the next session of the grand jury, charged with the murder of Henry Sauvage.

While here the sheriff will make a quiet investigation of the charges that have been preferred against Deputy Sheriff Finnerty at Don Luis. A few days ago a petition was circulated in that vicinity charging the officer with abuse toward a prisoner and making an unlawful arrest. Other complaints have been received from time to time, and the sheriff has determined to make an investigation on his own hook.

Yesterday the friends of Deputy Finnerty were circulating a petition at Lowell, Don Luis and Bisbee in behalf of that officer, whom they desire retained in his present capacity as a deputy sheriff.

The petitioners state that Officer Finnerty is a most efficient officer and an honorable citizen. That on more than one occasion he has captured desperate criminals at the risk of his own life, and that the undersigned petitioners have always found him entirely honest and trustworthy. It is also stated that the deputy sheriff is now in the employ of the E. P. & S. W. R. R. as special watchman, and that it is the wish of said company that the deputy be retained in his present position, adding, that in the opinion of the citizens whose names are signed to the petition, his life and property would be endangered by the revocation of his commission as a deputy sheriff at Don Luis.

The petition was signed by more than a hundred business men and property owners of Bisbee, Lowell and Don Luis, and is a flattering endorsement of the Don Luis officer.

OLD BALL TEAM HAS \$1,000 TO BET

WANTS TO WAGER THAT AMOUNT IT CAN DEFEAT NEW TEAM.

Letter Declines to Put Up Equal Amount, But is Open to Game—Big Crowd Expected to Go to Tucson on Sunday.

The Gymnasium ball team, which goes to Tucson on Sunday, expects to take with it a great crowd of friends to help encourage winning runs over the home plate. Aside from the ball enthusiasts it is expected that a large number of others will go on the excursion, taking advantage of the remarkably low rate of \$3.50 for the round trip that has been made.

The gymnasium club feels confident of returning home with a winning to its credit. In that event there may be withdrawal of an offer made by Manager Jacques of the old Bisbee team of a wager of \$1,000 that the old team can defeat the new team. Manager Jacques has stated for the players of the old team that they will put up \$100 each that they can win the proposed game. The gymnasium team has declined the wager, but announces that it is open to a game with the old team on the first clear date. This can not arrive previous to Sunday, September 3, the new team having three Sunday games now booked. These are with Tucson next Sunday and that following, when the Tucson team comes here, and a game on Sunday, the 20th, with Tombstone. This latter meeting was arranged following postponement because of rain of the game that was to have been played at Clouderoff last Sunday.

Manager Jacques, of the old ball team, has as yet arranged no games for his organization for future dates. He is, however, endeavoring to get some strong teams in for visits within the next couple of months. The members of the old team are all here, and are keeping in playing form.

WORK ON THE NEW CUT-OFF COMMENCES

FORCE OF THIRTY MEN IN CAMP ESTABLISHED NEAR BAKERSVILLE.

Preparations Indicate Construction is to Be Crowded—Big Rattlesnakes Captured by C. C. Hight Near Lowell.

Thirty men have gone into camp near Bakersville and are preparing to take up at once the work of building the new E. P. & S. W. cutoff. Since Tuesday the force has been engaged in setting up carts which will be used in conveying dirt and materials to and from the right of way and in making tools ready for the commencement in earnest of building. At the lower end of the route of the cut off some work on the roadbed has already commenced. All along the line there will be activity in plenty during the coming week. How long the construction of the cutoff will require is as yet problematical, but the preparations being made for the work indicate that a big force is to be thrown on and kept active.

In the show window of the Lowell Drug Co., the Review's Lowell Agency, there are on display a bunch of snakes that are attracting much attention from the public. Two of the occupants of the glass fronted box are rattlers, while the other is a large specimen of the road-runner. This latter snake is over three feet in length. Of the two rattlers one is of great size. His fangs show his age to be thirty-two years. The other carries twelve rattlers. The snakes have so far displayed no tendency to disagreement in their strange environment, but it is expected that the rattlers and the road runner will not continue in peace for long in the same compartment. The snakes were captured by and are the property of C. C. Hight. He got them in the vicinity of Lowell.

Construction of the long delayed Lowell jail has commenced. Contractor Moore says that the structure will be ready for the entertainment of violators of the law within a couple of weeks. The building gets a cement finish on the outside, and will be a structure of creditable appearance.

CENTRAL BUILDING WILL BE DELAYED

WORK WILL HALT LAST OF THIS WEEK BECAUSE OF LACK OF MATERIAL.

Joists Supposed to Be on Way Weeks Ago Have But Recently Been Shipped From Oregon—Finish in December.

Construction work at the new Central School building is due to be checked for an indefinite period at the end of the present week. This is because joists, ordered two months ago by the contractors, and supposed by them to have been shipped from Oregon weeks ago, were not shipped until the latter part of last week.

The last of this week will find the contractors in need of joists before they can proceed further with their work, and the material will not be on hand. They are coming from Oregon to San Pedro by schooner and will not reach the port for reshipment by rail to this city until some time next week, possibly not then if rough weather is encountered on the way. In view of the situation of the Southern Pacific in Salt Lake Basin there is no assurance when the rail delivery will be made of the lumber.

Principal Philbrook of the school, who is looking after the work at the new building, in the interest of the school board, said yesterday that the present outlook was that unexpected delays barred. The new building would be finished about the first of December. School will consequently be opened in the old Central building and continue there until the new building is ready. Furniture for the new building will probably be ordered by the school board next week. Bids from a number of sources are in hand.

The new school building the board is erecting at South Bisbee is nearing completion. The frame work is now all up. The building will be of one room and a large hall. It is to have cement plaster finish on both the exterior and interior, and be delivered to the school board on the 25th of this month.

occasion answered that they knew nothing of their whereabouts, at the same time both girls were confined in the rooms occupied by them.

Later developments in the case show that the girls had no assistance from the outside at the time they made their escape from the school, but cleverly eluded the matron and had been gone several hours before their absence was discovered.

According to the story of one of the girls, as they were passing through the streets of Benson, Piersol and his companions enticed them to their rooms.

One of the escaped girls is from Benson and the other from Bisbee.

Supt. Berner, of the Industrial School, stated to the Review over the telephone last evening, that the charge of rape would be prosecuted against the man at the next session of the grand jury, and in the meantime should they pay the fines assessed against them, instead of serving the time in jail, the charges would be preferred immediately.
