COUNCILMAN ORD IS REMOVED FROM OFFICE

DECLARED HE HAS BEEN ABSENT FROM CITY OVER STATUTORY TIME.

Subway Put Up to Property Owners. Sewer Proposals Untracked—Assessment Roll Adopted as Returned.

A sufficient number of City Councilmen were rounded up last night to have a quorum present, and business that could not be postponed any longer was taken up and acted upon. Those present were Mayor Taylor, Messrs. Hogan, Sogile, Hughes and Devine.

The Council met first as a Board of Equalization, and the assessment roll as originally submitted by the assessor, without raises, inspection or other frills provided for by the ordinance, was accepted. The Board then adjourned until the first day of September, when its next legal meeting, according to the ordinance, will occur.

The members then came to order as the City Council and took up the sewerage system question. It is quite probable, from the indecision displayed during the discussion that was indulged in that the system will be installed some time during the next century.

Two propositions to furnish plans and estimates have been furnished the Council. One by Nelson Rhodes for \$200, and the other by Engineer Olmstead for \$500. No action was taken upon either.

Both called for the city to furnish, through its engineer, a map of the streets and likewise their elevations, and upon motion of Mr. Hughes the City Clerk was instructed to secure the same from the City Engineer, and likewise have him hunt up some out-of-the-way place to dump the sewage in.

To have given a good start toward securing a sewerage system it would only have been necessary for the Council to have accepted either one of the propositions offered by the experts, but no one seemed to absorb the matter remains in about the same condition as it was before the meeting.

The question of the Council accepting the care of the subway was turned down upon the advice of the City Attorney, and the subway will now either have to take care of itself or have a committee of property holders appointed to nurse it.

This was the sum total of discussion of the matter of the subway, which at the present time is nearly filled with debris, and is a menace every hour of day and night to life and property. Though the experience of last Saturday night is still fresh in mind and all now have knowledge of what keeping of the subway in condition means in the way of safety to the city and its people, the Council did not see fit to advance either aid or suggestion. It would seem to be up to that part of the public most vitally interested at once get together and arrange a feasible plan for presentation to the Council for action.

The exceedingly meandering condition of affairs as they stand with relation to the subway indicates that some action can not be taken a moment too soon.

Other business transacted at the meeting was as follows:

Special Officer Thompson was made a regular member of the force to police the red light district and Brewery Gulch.

School Superintendent Philbrook was given permission to make connections with the fire mains from the school house.

Mayor Taylor was authorized to deed L. R. Allen a small triangle of ground to regulate the lines on some of his property, and the street light

NUMBERING OF HOUSES OF CITY

THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO EVOLVE COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM PROGRESSES.

Expected That Within a Few Days It Will Have Completed Its Work. Accomplishment of This Means Free Mail Delivery for City.

The committee of Council authorized to take up the matter of numbering the houses of the city have been assiduously at work the last few days. Consulting with them and adding his suggestions has been Mr. Patton, who was designated by the Council some time ago to superintend the numbering work when it was commenced.

City Clerk Hicks the first of the week received from number supply houses a varied assortment of numbers of all kinds of designs and styles of fixtures. These were looked over yesterday by the committee and Mr. Patton, and the price lists accompanying also inspected. No final decision has yet been arrived at, but it is probable that a number quite similar to those previously used in the city will be used, in order to prevent confusion.

It is also probable that when the new numbers are put up the old ones will be torn down, leaving only the new number in evidence on the house.

Plans for the numbering have not yet progressed sufficiently to allow of the formation of any definite outline. The committee expects in a few days it will have surmounted the difficult part of the work, and it will then be ready to tell how it proposes going about the numbering so that the city will be systematically arranged on the number book. It is confidently felt that a system can be worked out that will be comprehensive in every way. This is all that is necessary to accomplish in order get free delivery of mail service in the city, and it is to get this service that the numbering was largely decided upon by the Council. The committee's work to date indicates that it will be entirely successful in attaining the end desired. Given houses systematically numbered and streets plainly marked, Postmaster Cassidy will be able to have mail carriers leaving the postoffice a couple of times a day in short order.

TREMENDOUS RAIN KINDLY PASSED BY

LEFT UNPREPARED BISBEE OUT OF ITS ITINERARY YESTERDAY.

Swamped Tombstone and Filled the San Pedro to the Brim—River Still Rising—Threatens to Do Serious Damage.

Light rains fell in the city throughout the night, but the storm that seemed probable when the showers began about 6 o'clock yesterday evening, was missed. What Bisbee got was merely a sprinkle from the outside edges of a fierce storm experienced yesterday afternoon and evening in the San Pedro valley.

Reports from Tombstone last night stated that the rain had there was one of the heaviest in the history of the town. It amounted almost to a cloudburst, and literally swamped things. In the San Pedro valley the precipitation was said to have been even heavier.

As a result of the downpour the San Pedro river commenced rising rapidly yesterday afternoon, and last night was running bank full, threatening much ground and crops of various kinds with overflow. In the event of the latter occurring the loss to the farmers in the valley will be heavy.

Some danger was felt to threaten the railroad from the river, but up to a late hour this had not materialized. Had the same rain been had up Tombstone canyon yesterday, Bisbee would have been drowned out. From all accounts the precipitation was heavier and of greater duration than that had here on last Saturday night. Had it come in Tombstone canyon it would have found the subway filled to within three feet of its roof, and nothing short of the miraculous could have prevented an overflow and the turning of the entire volume of water down Main street.
