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## MINER FALLS 180 FEET TO SUDDEN DEATH

John B. Schulz, of Oxnard, Cal., Met Terrible Death at Property of Great Sulphide Company Near Silver Bell.

TUCSON, Dec. 29.—Hurled 180 feet down a mine shaft in a big bucket used to haul at water John B. Schulz, manager of the properties of the Great Sulphide Mining Company in the Silver Bell district met instant death yesterday afternoon. His remains were brought to Tucson this morning. It is not known definitely what caused the accident beyond the fact that some portion of the machinery evidently became displaced.

M. V. Carr, of Oxnard, Cal., one of the owners of the property and a life long friend of the unfortunate man nearly had his hand cut in two while attempting to stop the descending bucket by grabbing the steel cable and fell crashing to the bottom of the shaft. When the bucket began its rapid descent, Carr rushed to the brake and attempted to apply it. He failed in this and then he made a heroic attempt to stop the mad descent by grabbing the steel cable with his bare hand. The cable tore cruelly through his hand and nearly severed the member. A Mexican laborer who was assisting in the lowering of Schulz was struck by the beam to which horses are attached and knocked unconscious. He revived after an hour. Immediately after the accident Carr rushed over to the property of the Mina Cobra and there notified them of the mishap. Several miners from this property went at once to the Great Sulphide and took with them a grappling hook and a new cable. They pulled out the bucket and found Schulz lying dead in the bucket. A wagon was then secured and the remains were brought here at 2 o'clock this morning. Schulz was 37 years old and was a resident of Oxnard, Cal. He was a sturdy man.

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## SHOOTS WIFE AND COMMITS SUICIDE

She Crawled to Neighbor's With Two Bullet Holes In Her Head.

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—With two bullets in her head, Mrs. John J. O'Rourke lay for half an hour in her home in Morris Park, L. I., early today, fainting death, while her husband, who had shot her, sat by her side to make sure she was dead. Though enduring agony, the woman dared not move even an eyelid. Her torture was not even ended when, after thirty minutes, her husband raised the revolver and fired a bullet into his brain. She heard the shot and heard the man fall, but she thought that perhaps he was only wounded, and might shoot her again. For two hours longer she lay and suffered before she dared make a move to seek aid. She waited almost too long, for loss of blood had made her so weak that she was barely able to crawl to the residence of her nearest neighbor before she fainted. It is thought, however, that she will recover.

## UPPER LOWELL'S CLUB HOUSE IS UNDER WAY MR. DODGE IS DIRECTOR IN CANANEA CO.

Grading Now Being Done—Building Is Of Mission Style, Open To All Residents of That Section.

With the commencement of the preparatory work for the new club house at Upper Lowell, that town has renewed assurance of being able to get more enjoyment out of life in the future than it has had in the past, owing to the natural difficulties under which towns of the Warren District exist. The new club house will not only afford a place where the residents of the town may enjoy themselves, but from an architectural standpoint it will class with the best buildings in the district.

The club house will be erected at an approximate cost of \$7000, \$1000 of which has been contributed by the residents of Upper Lowell, and the remaining \$6000 by the Copper Queen Consolidated Mining Company. The club will be open to all residents of Upper Lowell, and will be controlled by the Upper Lowell Improvement Club, to which organization the building will belong.

The site selected for the building is near Upper Lowell and facing the ice plant. The plans and specifications call for a building of the popular mission style, constructed of cement blocks. All of the wood work in the structure will be of the best quality of Maplewood.

The club house will contain three large rooms; one a dancing hall, measuring 25 feet by 50, on one side of which there will be an alcove, where in an orchestra can be placed; and two rooms—one on either side of the entrance hall—which will be used as reading rooms and cloak rooms. Running around three sides of the structure will be a covered porch 10 feet wide, the floor of which will be of reinforced concrete.

At the present time workmen are doing the necessary grading for the foundation, and as the material has been ordered it will be a matter of but a very short time before the building itself is under course of erection.

According to the present plans for the electric car line which will be constructed by the Copper Queen Company, the new club house will be within 200 feet of the right of way.

How Cole and Ryan Became Dominant—Big Plans Ahead for Handling of Merged Companies.

Boston—About six months ago Thos. F. Cole and John D. Ryan entered the Cananea camp through the purchase of the American property for \$2,250,000, a property that had been turned down by Boston capital within six months previously for \$500,000. This property was capitalized on the basis of 400,000 shares, par \$10, but only \$5 per share was called at the time of promotion. An additional large acreage without any ore showing, was purchased from the Greene Consolidated Co. for 200,000 shares of stock, fully paid \$10 per share, or \$2,000,000, making the total capitalization outstanding 600,000 shares, upon which only \$2,000,000 in cash has been raised. This capital also covered another small property known as the Cananea-Duluth Co.

A considerable portion of the 400,000 shares outside of the Greene Co. treasury was pooled and it was not a very difficult proposition to steadily advance this stock in the market to \$40 per share. At the time of the formation of the company Colonel William C. Greene was given 40,000 shares of the stock, \$5 per share, paid in full, and with the advance in Cananea-Central stock it was not long before Colonel Greene had a larger financial interest in the latter company than in his own company, Greene Consolidated.

When Messrs. Cole and Ryan entered the Cananea camp, it is very evident that a prospective absorption of the Greene Consolidated Co. was in their mind for the Amalgamated long had envious eyes upon this 60,000,000-pound producer and twice had missed securing control of it.

For some time the Greene Co. has had to meet some rather difficult metallurgical problems, its ore values have been steadily decreasing in far greater ratio than its cost sheets. The great Greene Co. is no longer the high grade copper producer that made it famous and permitted a production of 5,000,000 pounds of copper per month almost from its inception.

In the early days of its discovery it was able to produce 5,000,000 pounds of copper per month from its smelter operations alone, but its rich ores did not last and the company was compelled to build a 1000-ton concentrator in order to treat its lower grade ores and maintain its production. Then it doubled its concentrator capacity, built roasting plants, etc., and has spent millions of dollars in placing itself in a position to treat its low grade ores and maintain an output of 5,000,000 pounds per month.

Colonel Greene offered Dr. L. D. Ricketts, of the Phelps-Dodge forces \$50,000 a year to manage the company.

But this offer was turned down. The Greene problem increased, and at this time the Cole-Ryan interests entered the situation, and removed the burden from Colonel Greene's shoulders.

The great metallurgical staff at command of the Cole-Ryan-Amalgamated interests will immediately be set to work on the Greene proposition, a new smelter will be built of large capacity, and enlarged concentrator erected on a large scale. The Greene Co. will furnish the concentrating ores and the Cananea-Central the high grade smelting ores, as that company has not as yet treated its high grade ores which lie near surface in the Cananea camp. Later on the Cananea-Central will probably develop into a low grade proposition as has the Greene.

The Cananea-Central properties have not been paid for as yet, but the second \$5 per share on the 400,000 shares will be immediately called and the Eastern Lindsay interests will receive their \$2,500,000 for which they sold the American property to the Cole-Ryan interests.

Colonel Greene and Myron Parker will be the only Greene Consolidated interests on the new board of directors. Of the remaining seven, six will be Cole-Ryan-Amalgamated men, including James Houston, Joim Congdon, and W. A. Duncan, now directors of the Cananea-Central, Calumet & Arizona and North Butte companies. Cleveland Dodge, of Phelps-Dodge & Co., will also be a director of the new company, representing an ownership of 15,000 shares of Greene Consolidated stock in the Phelps-Dodge treasury.

The question naturally arises, if the Greene Co. was unable to earn its dividend of \$2.40 per share upon 1,000,000 shares the past year, what will be the dividend policy of the new company with 2,500,000 shares of stock, for the Cananea-Central will not be able to contribute very largely to the earnings for some time to come.

History has apparently been making fast in the formation of this big company. Messrs. Cole and Ryan reached New York on Dec. 4, Colonel Greene Dec. 5, and on that date we stated that it was intimated to us that the acquisition of the Greene Co. was the object of the New York visitation of these interests.

A week ago last Saturday Colonel Greene prepared to call a meeting of stockholders to vote upon an issue of 250,000 new shares of Greene Co. stock at \$25 per share for the construction of a new smelter and enlargement of the concentrating mill. Saturday night these circulars were sent for the fire and within a few days of that time official announcement was made of the absorption of the Greene Co.

Boston—Although he will be a large stockholder in the Greene Cananea Copper Co., Norman B. Ream, owing to a pressure of other business, will not be a director in the new company, contrary to earlier expectations. Mr. Ream is one of the heaviest holders of Greene Consolidated Copper Co. shares and will exercise his privilege in exchanging for Greene-Cananea stock. The Greene Copper dividend due to be declared at this time has not yet

been acted upon. The previous dividend was declared Oct. 10.
