FUNERAL OF CHILD. The funeral of Annie Smith, the two and a half year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Smith was buried yesterday afternoon by the Palace Undertaking company. The child had been suffering for some time from croup and finally died Saturday morning. A fatal incident connected with the death of the child is the fact that not quite eight months ago, Mr. and Mrs. Smith buried a younger baby, and now they are left childless. The interment took place at Evergreen cemetery.

PASSES THROUGH CITY. Jeff Kidder, of the Arizona Rangers, passed through the city last evening on his way from the northern portion of the county to the headquarters of the ranger force at Douglas. Kidder has recently been exonerated from all blame in connection with the killing of a man whom he attempted to arrest in the Switzer City some weeks ago, and at whom he found it necessary to shoot to protect his life, as the man fired a shot at him. Kidder is one of the crack shots of the Rangers, and when he threw down on his man he killed him the first shot.

UNDERGOES OPERATION. John A. Knight underwent an operation at the C. & A. Hospital yesterday afternoon, to obtain relief from a malady which afflicted him for some time past. Last summer Knight was taken down with typhoid fever, and after recovering from the disease did not regain his normal weight. About six weeks ago the physicians thought it advisable for him to take a trip to California, but this did not do him any good, so he returned to Bisbee a few days ago. An examination yesterday brought out the fact that an operation was necessary, and it was performed at once. The hospital authorities stated last evening that Knight had gone through the operation very well, and that he was resting easy.

RETURN FROM CANANEA. W. H. Brophy and M. J. Cunningham were passengers on the incoming train last evening from Cananea, where they have spent the last few days examining properties in which they are interested. Cunningham is heavily interested in the Bisbee-Cananea Development Company, which took over the Bisbee No. 1 property not long ago, and he went over the portion of the property whereon development work is being prosecuted. He expressed himself as being highly pleased with the progress of the work, which is being performed with the utmost rapidity that is consistent with good execution.

GOVERNMENT TO THE SOCIALISTS INVESTIGATE CATTLE DISEASE HOLD A MEETING

Reports of "Big Jaw" Among Cattle Herds of Yavapai Call Forth Action on Part of Inspectors.

At a meeting of the socialist of Phoenix held at the place Sunday, the following resolutions were passed and will be presented to the legislature by a committee composed of socialists from this and other counties of Arizona, and representatives of the different labor organizations of the territory:

Whereas, on Feb. 17, 1906, three American citizens named W. D. Hayward, Chas. H. Moyer and George A. Pettibone, were seized in the night by armed thugs, acting in the name of the law, in the city of Denver, Colorado, and were then kidnaped from their homes and families; and, Whereas, this kidnaping was brought about by the illegal conduct of the two governors of the states of Idaho and Colorado, both tools of the capitalist class, in general and of the Mine Owners' association in particular; and,

Resolved, that the citizens of this state, in mass meeting assembled, on this Sunday, January 27, 1907, do hereby enter our strongest protest against this exhibition of capitalist anarchy; that we believe our politics thorough investigation that it has made its appearance in a number of cases on the ranges all the way from the Weaver Mountains to the Juniper country, and as soon as Animal Inspector times arrive, we will make thorough investigation will be made covering the affected sections.

"The disease has not reached the alarming stage yet," he added, "but if not stamped out early it will spread and cause serious trouble. The government authorities are very anxious that it should be stamped out before it affects the herds grazing on the forest reserves, which have so far escaped becoming infected with it."

Resolved, that we tender Messrs. Moyer, Hayward and Pettibone our moral, financial and physical support in this hour of their danger, and emphatically declare that in the light of the present situation we should die, rather than witness the working of the law, which is the reason why; and be it further

Resolved, that engrossed copies of these resolutions be prepared and presented to the legislature at the next session, and that the request be made that the said legislature, by resolution present the same to the president and congress of the United States, with the request that they investigate the kidnaping of Moyer, Hayward and Pettibone; and, be it further Resolved, that a copy of Supreme Court Justice McKenna's dissenting opinion be appended to these resolutions.

WEALTHY MERCHANT PROVIDES FOR POOR

Takes Care of Rowing, Football and All Other Such Sports.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The will of William Whiteley, the merchant who died some few days ago, makes a number of large charitable bequests, the chief being the setting aside of \$5,000,000 to provide and maintain almshouses to be known as the "Whiteley Homes for the Aged Poor."

The will leaves \$250,000 to each of Mr. Whiteley's two sons, and his sister and her two daughters; are given annuities of \$5000. His wife, from whom he had separated, was "provided for during life."

In addition to several other family and household bequests, Mr. Whiteley left sums varying from \$2,500 to \$10,000 to a number of hospitals. Two sums of \$25,000 each are left in trust to be applied to the giving annually through a certain clergyman of "Whiteley Christmas gifts," while the income of the second sum is to be devoted to the promotion of cricket, football, rowing, and swimming.

Most of the shops in the West-bourne Grove district kept up their shutters and more than a hundred carriages followed the hearse to the cemetery. Four of these were laden with floral wreaths.

Know All Men by These Presents: That we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves together and agree upon the following Articles of Incorporation, under the provisions of Chapter 33, "Revised Laws of 1905," of the State of Minnesota, and do hereby adopt the following Articles:

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be DENN-ARIZONA COPPER COMPANY. ARTICLE II. The general nature of the business of this corporation shall be the mining, smelting, reducing, refining and working of iron ores, copper ores, and other minerals; the manufacturing of iron, steel, engine and other metals; and the marketing of any such ores or products; any or all of said business to be carried on in the State of Minnesota, Territory of Arizona or elsewhere.
