The Tennesseans are going home. Back at Nashville they are getting ready to give the wandering sons and daughters of the old Volunteer state a splendid reception between September 23 and 28 and the descendants of Houston, Jackson, Johnson, Sevier, Crockett, Farragut and Polk and all of that illustrious host are going back from everywhere to sit a little while under the shadow of Old Hickory and wander among the stately halls of the centennial city by the placid lake.

They will speed through fields of golden rod and hedges of flaming sun-choke. They will tarry for the miracle of the first frost which kisses open the velvet chestnut burr, glosses the cheek of the chinquapin, muscadine and haw, fells the persimmon, fattens the succulent marsupial and brings substantial visions of hick-bones and turnip greens.

The fields will no longer be white with daisies; the tender green of the sweetbrier will be scar, wild rose and honeysuckle will be desolate; the dead pale leaves of the dogwood will have formed the sweet williams' starry shroud, and the magnolia's ivory petals will have been entangled in the moss swinging from live-oak bough to dreamy waters far below, but there will be recompense. COUNTY BALANCE AMOUNTS TO \$62,593.66

Receipts and Expenditures For Month of July Reveal Good Condition of Finances for Cochise County.

(Special to Review.) TOMBSTONE, Aug. 2.—The various county officials have been busy the past two days in making up their usual monthly reports. The report of Treasurer Gaines shows that during the month the county received the sum of \$7,887.92. Of this amount the various justices of the peace in the county contributed the following: Judge Rice, Douglas, \$397.85; Judge Page, Wilcox, \$5.70; H. H. Tallafiero, Naco, \$5.20; R. S. Grier, Lowell, \$65.05; H. D. Cheseldine, Benson, \$123.65; T. D. Burdick, Bisbee, \$265.00; J. W. Hogan, Bisbee, \$9.30; M. S. Butler, Paradise, \$74.15.

The rent of the rooms to the United States court officials contributed \$475; while back taxes collected during the month of July was \$979.50. The assessor's office is credited with the largest amount turned in during the month. Assessor Howe turning in \$1270.81 for personal property taxes collected, and \$1000 collected as school taxes. The sheriff's office contributed \$1377.50 collected from general licenses, and \$82 collected as fines. The county recorder's office received \$1000 for recording instruments during the month of July. The probate court collected as fees from various estates and from the issuances of marriage licenses the sum of \$195.85. There were 40 of the latter at \$2.90 per copy. The balance of the receipts were made up of small amounts from various sources.



GROWTH OF RAILROAD BUSINESS IN DISTRICT Don't forget the change at the Orpheum—Wednesdays and Sundays. Here is an evidence of the growth of the industries in this section of the southwest, including Douglas, Bisbee, Cananea and Naco. It also shows the enormous business being done by the El Paso and Southwestern railway. A year ago, when Chief Dispatcher McCallum took charge of the trainmaster's office here there were five chain crews running out of Douglas and four chain crews running out of El Paso on the western division of the road. Today there are thirteen of these crews running out of Douglas and nine running out of El Paso. Besides these crews there are two regular ore trains running between Douglas and Bisbee and two regular local crews running out of Douglas. This is an increase of 66 per cent in working crews on the road over this time last year.

Superintendent F. B. King arrived this afternoon from El Paso. T. S. McIntyre is the new train dispatcher in the trainmaster's office Mr. McIntyre came here from London, Ontario, Canada, taking the place of J. P. Nash, who has returned to the train service and is now running a freight train on the western division. Trainmaster Elford went to Hachita this morning on business. Increase in business at that point has necessitated the placing of day and night yard crews there to handle the cars coming from the Clifton country. Heretofore the yard work at Hachita has been performed by the train crews arriving there. C. A. Schneider, who for the past two months has held the position of general foreman in the Douglas shops, has been promoted to the position of master mechanic of the western division.
