STUB MAKES LAST RUN.

Yesterday afternoon the stub train which has been operating between Bisbee and Omborn for several years past, making two round trips daily, made its last run, as the new schedule of the El Paso & Southwestern is now in effect. Bisbee is on the main line of the railroad now, and will have two trains in each direction daily. Commencing this morning the trains will be run on the schedule published in the Review during the past couple of days as follows:

From El Paso will arrive at 8:20 instead of 8:40.

To Benson will leave at 8:40 instead of 8:55.

To El Paso will leave at 4:45 as at present.

POLLARD AT Y. M. C. A.

Still Give Charity Rate.

The El Paso & Southwestern, the Southern Pacific and other lines running into El Paso have not followed suit in the action of the Santa Fe in eliminating the charity half rate. Not only have they not done this at El Paso, whence came the first announcement of the Santa Fe's proposal, but so far at least as the Southern Pacific is concerned, this commendable policy will not be altered in the least in the coming year.

Chief Clerk De Pass said yesterday, when asked about the matter: "The announcement of the Santa Fe of its withdrawal of the charity half rate for poor was not the result of a joint conference for the reason that it is the only line entering El Paso which has withdrawn it. Our office here in Tucson has received no notification of any such action and it is not believed that the Southern Pacific contemplates taking it."

GOLD IN EAST.
C. Z. Taylor of Douglas has just received a letter from his brother in Pittsburg, who is with a large contracting company there, and says that the east has lately been growing more and more like the stories of the golden west when paper money was unknown. He says that never before have a stern people been handling so much gold in carrying on their business. Paper money is said to be rarely seen now and all cash business is carried on with either gold or silver—Douglas Dispatch.
