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NEW MEXICO HAS NO ASSURANCE. When the death blow was struck to the hopes of New Mexico for admission as a state during the present session of congress, the report was flashed over the wires that Gov. Curry, of that territory had been given the assurance that the New Mexico statehood bill would be taken up and passed at the short session of the Sixtyth congress.

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Here is another evidence that President Roosevelt is not directing legislation at Washington, for did not the strenuous one promise Gov. Curry while they were gliding down the Mississippi river in the vicinity of Cairo, Illinois, that the bill for the admission of New Mexico should be passed by the present session of congress? We feel sorry for Gov. Curry and also for the people of New Mexico, who have been again deceived in the matter of their statehood aspiration.

After receiving the promise from President Roosevelt Gay, Curry hurried back to his people full of gladness and enthusiasm and at once made a trip through the territory telling the people of the promise which had been made of deliverance from territorial bondage. At every principal city the governor was met with a band and the best oratorical talent. Red fire was burnt unparingly and everybody said that Teddy was the real savior of all the people residing between the summit of the White mountains and the Pecos.

Arizona and New Mexico are both qualified for statehood and have been for years, but Arizona has at least escaped more fortunate this year than our sister territory, because the people of Arizona have about come to the conclusion to rely no more on republican promises of statehood. The republican national convention at Philadelphia eight years ago declared in favor of the EARLY admission of Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma as states. With that promise yet unfulfilled we advise our New Mexico friends to put no dependence in future promises.

Arizona leads the world in copper production and the Warren district leads in Arizona. It is likely that more copper will be produced from the Warren district during the year 1908 than ever before. While in Arizona are to be found many districts where copper is mined at good profit the developed properties in the Warren district are in a position to turn out more ore than all the other copper properties in the territory. Great is Arizona! as a copper producer, because of the magnitude of the industry in the Warren district.

From all the copper mining districts in the territory comes news of returning activity in both production and development. In Globe, Clifton, Morenci the companies are showing signs of a determination to beat the copper producers of last year. CHAFING DISH COOKERY.

An Easy Way to Prepare Light and Dainty Meals. The chafing dish is most useful for a number of cooking purposes. It is specially designed for use on the table in order to prepare light, hot dishes suitable for breakfast, luncheon or supper.

The chafing dish will also be found a useful adjunct to the sickroom, as by its help various food preparations can be cooked or kept hot. No up to date housekeeper should be without a chafing dish, because its resources are almost unlimited. A chafing dish set comprises besides the dish and cover a tray or stand or in case of a silver dish both, fork, spoon, skimmer and a slice or turner, together with a flagon to hold the alcohol.

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WHAT TO EAT.

Delicious Salads in Which Nuts Play a Prominent Part. A few green peppers of the mild kind are a delightful addition to a plain tomato salad, and a few chives or tiny young onions finely minced will enhance the flavor still further.

A pretty salad to look at is one of tomato jelly cut in strips. On each strip is placed a slice of pineapple. Arrange a bed of parsley in the center of a platter. Place the strips of jelly upon it, decorate the top of each with mayonnaise dressing and arrange stuffed olives in a circle around the edge.

For a crock salad cut the tops off of six sweet peppers, remove the veins and seeds without injuring the skin and place them in cold water. Chop a Spanish onion, two tomatoes and a red pepper, add a spoonful of chili sauce, a little salt, three tablespoons of crushed crumbs and enough olive oil to moisten well. Take the peppers from the water they are standing in dry them and fill with the mixture. Let them stand on the ice until ready to serve, then cover with dressing and garnish with bits of cheese and stuffed olives.

Edible cups, such as the sweet peppers make, are most attractive for individual services of salad. Tomatoes and cucumbers are often used in this way, and so are boiled beets (hollowed out), as well as apples and celery root. Beet cups are suitable for shredded cabbage, diced potatoes, celery moistened with dressing or any mixed vegetable salad.

A mushroom salad will be a novelty to many. Peel twelve good sized mushrooms and cut them into pieces. Saute them a few moments in a little butter, add two drops of onion juice and season with mixture. Scoop out the inside of a few chilled tomatoes—enough tomatoes to hold all the mayonnaise—and fill the tomatoes. Decorate the tops of them with a spoonful of mayonnaise.

Walnuts and other kinds of nuts are now used in salads as never before, and they are used in eccentric ways. For instance, tomatoes hollowed out to form cups are stuffed with pineapple and English walnuts, then served with a mayonnaise dressing on a bed of lettuce leaves. At an attractive luncheon the other day walnut meats were served with slices of bananas and mayonnaise on a bed of lettuce. Walnuts are even combined with potatoes in the following way: Cut potatoes into round balls. Boil them until tender, then cool, and to three cupsful of cooked potato balls add a cup of shelled and chopped English walnuts, half a cup of boiled cream dressing and a half teaspoonful of grated onion. After tossing all together heap it into a salad bowl lined with watercress. The salad will be better if prepared several hours beforehand, so that the dressing will flavor it sufficiently.
