WILBUR WRIGHT HAS HIS TURN


Breaks European Record For Aerial Flight. Carries Self and a Passenger.

ITINERARY OF TAFT COVERS MANY POINTS

Special From Tucson Says Bisbee Man, Thought Dangerously Ill is Doing Well. Will Return Here Today.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 16.—Senator Dixon, director of the western speakers bureau, who has personally arranged the details of the itinerary of Judge Taft, today gave out this statement: "Secretary Taft will start on his western trip, leaving Cincinnati on the morning of September 23, speaking at Brook, Ind., at George Ales Fair at noon, night of Sept. 24, at Milwaukee and at Madison on Sept. 25, Sunday, 27th, he will rest at Minneapolis, in the afternoon, Sept. 28, he will leave Minneapolis on Monday morning, Sept. 28, and have a daylight run through Minnesota, speaking at the Corn Palace Fair at Sept. 29 he will be in South Dakota, speaking at the Corn Palace Fair at Mitchell, in the afternoon, Sept. 30, he will speak at Fort Dodge, Ia., at noon and at Omaha at night, October 1 will be a daylight western trip through Nebraska, speaking at Denver on the night of Oct. 2, and Oct. 3 will be an east bound trip through Kansas, speaking at Topeka. That night, Sunday, Oct. 4, he will rest at Kansas City.

Oct. 5, will be a daylight trip through Missouri, with a speech at noon at St. Joseph. He will reach St. Louis on the morning of Oct. 6 and remain in that city all day, reaching Chicago in order to open the Deep Water Ways Convention at 11:30 Thursday, Oct. 7. Leaving Chicago about 1 o'clock, he will attend the fifth anniversary of the Lincoln-Douglas debate at Galesburg, Ill., at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The details of the trips between these important places will be arranged for by the chairman of committee."

The second trip will take him to Kentucky, Tennessee and possibly North Carolina. The last trip will be to the east. New York city will be visited and a speech will be made in the northern part of the empire state. New England will not be included in this trip but, speeches will be made in Maryland, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio, which will bring the candidate back to his native city of the section.

This plan of campaign for the Republican presidential candidate was decided on today at a conference between Taft, Chairman Hitchcock, Senator Dixon of Montana, director of the western speakers bureau, Nagel, national committee man from Missouri and in charge of the Chicago Republican headquarters, Robert A. Ballinger of Washington of the advisory committee, and A. L. Vorys.

Taft will travel in a special train and with him will be other speakers of national reputation. It was said today that Senator Dolliver of Iowa would likely be one. After the conference Hitchcock expressed himself generally on the manner of campaign which has been decided upon, making it plain that beginning with the first of October the racket and red fire features will be fast enough and strenuous enough to silence any criticism. After the conference Chairman Hitchcock left for New York, Mr. Nagel went to St. Louis, and Senator Dixon, after remaining for an extended talk with the candidate returned to Chicago.

HARMONY THE KEYNOTE WITH N. Y. DEMOCRATS

Nominees For State Ticket Named at Rochester Amid Enthusiasm. Platform Arraigns Hughes.

LIEUT. GOV. CHANLER NAMED FOR GOVERNOR

Slight Difference Over Farley. Judge Parker and Senator Gore Deliver Addresses

ROCHESTER, Sept. 16.—Nominating all but one of its candidates by acclamation and adopting a platform which arraigns the administration of Governor Hughes and pledges earnest support to the Denver platform and candidates, the Democratic state convention today named for governor, the head of its ticket for governor, the present lieutenant governor of the state, Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler of Dutchess county. All opposition to Mr. Chanler disappeared after a conference of the state leaders which occupied a greater part of last night.

HUGHES PROMISES HIS BEST SERVICES

ALBANY, Sept. 16.—The deep interest which the people are making in the conduct of their affairs is a most welcome sign. I wish to express to those who so generously testified to their confidence and their desire that I should be renominated, my cordial appreciation. I shall endeavor to show this by giving for the state, if I am re-elected, the best services of which I am capable. This statement was made by Governor Hughes today.

DAVID HILL REFUSES SENATE NOMINATION

ROCHESTER, Sept. 16.—Chairman Mack, of the Democratic National Committee, today telephoned to ex-Governor David B. Hill, at Albany, and at the request of the state leaders, asked him if he would permit the convention to name him as their choice for United States senator to fill the next vacancy. Mr. Hill replied that he appreciated the honor but that he had retired from political life and could not accept.

NEW HAMPSHIRE REPUBLICANS MEET

CONCORD, N. H., Sept. 16.—Tomorrow the Republicans of New Hampshire will meet in state convention to select a candidate for governor. There are three aspirants to the nomination, Rosecrans W. Pillsbury, Bertram Ellis, speaker of the state house of representatives, and Henry B. Quinby.

BURNS WILL FIGHT JOHNSON AT SYDNEY

SIDNEY, Sept. 16.—Jack Johnson, the American colored pugilist, has signed articles for a fight with Tommy Burns, the American Champion. The fight is to take place in this city in December and to be for the championship of the world. Burns said today that this would be his last fight.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—Jack Johnson, after signing articles for a fight with Burns, booked passage on a steamer for Sidney, sailing Friday. The terms of the match provide the winner shall receive \$50,000, and the loser \$20,000.

PRICE OF DESERTERS NOW FIXED AT \$50

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—According to an order issued at the war department today, a reward of \$50 will be paid in all cases where a deserter is delivered by civil officers or civilian to a military post, or at such other places as may be designated for his delivery by the proper military officers. In special cases and in the discretion of the secretary of war, the amount of the reward may be reduced.

IRELAND FREE IN 15 YEARS

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—The success of home rule movement is no longer in doubt, thanks to splendid moral support of United States and various British colonies Ireland will enjoy self government in less than 15 years. This was confident statement made tonight by John Redmond, noted nationalist leader and member of parliament who is here for three weeks visiting.

BEDE DEFEATED.

DULUTH, Sept. 16.—Returns from the eighth congressional district primaries show that Congressman J. Adam Bede has been overwhelmingly defeated for the Republican nomination by Clarence B. Miller.
