OLD INDIAN FIGHTERS FORM IN DENVER

DENVER, Colo., April 7.—Ten men who have experienced the perils of the plains and mountains in the days when the Indians looked upon the white man as his natural enemy, met here yesterday for the purpose of forming a society of veteran Indian fighters. Seven of the ten are Colorado pioneers, the other three among the earliest settlers of Wyoming.

All bear marks of bullets, arrows or tomahawks upon their bodies, the result of close encounters with the hostile Redskins. Most of them served in the militia, but this does not entitle them to pension. Though most of them lost their health in fighting for frontier settlers, and some were severely wounded, there is no law under which they can be placed upon the pension rolls. The purpose of the society is to secure for the members some recognition from the government in this respect.

REV. OAKES CONDUCTING SERVICES

Colton Minister Is in This City Conducting a Methodist Revival Which Is Largely Attended

Since the beginning of the week the Rev. I. L. Oakes of Colton, California, has been conducting regular revival meetings at the M. E. church and a great deal of interest has been awakened in the work by the forceful California minister.

Rev. Oakes last night said in part: "I am more and more convinced that in our modern revival methods we do not give large enough place



to the personality of Omnipotence on the human heart. If you want to know the importance of the office of the Holy Spirit in the salvation of the world turn to Jno. 16:7 and read "Nevertheless, I tell you the truth: it is expedient for you that I go away, for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come to you, but if I depart I will send him unto you."

How dear Christ had become to the heart and lives of His disciples and how they would miss him when they could see and hear him no more, but were so deliberately told that the Holy Spirit will be of more service and importance to them in working out the salvation of the world than that He, the Son of God, should remain with them in bodily form and person. If you will turn to Jno. 16:7 you will see what His mission is on the unregenerated heart. "An when He is come He will convince the world of sin and of righteousness, and of judgment. Coming to the disciples and working in and through them He, the Holy Spirit, is to save this old world from sin and bring it back into harmony with God. To the penitent sinners He comes to make intercession and reconciliation with God. Read Rom. 8. "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought; but the Spirit himself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered. He who committs his case to the office of the Holy Spirit will be led into the fellowship of saints."

The two young men came to Bisbee a few weeks ago, and succeeded in talking the grill out of two meal tickets. They claimed they had come to Bisbee to accept positions and would pay for the meal tickets as soon as they had received their first pay. The proprietor of the grill let them have the tickets upon the strength of their talk, and their promise to pay at the earliest possible moment.

Payment for the meals, however, was evidently far from their minds, for no sooner had they finished up the two meal tickets, than they "folded their tent like the Arab, and slinked away." New scenes and greener fields were calling them, and with ear to the ground they hit the outward trail.

The proprietor of the Bisbee Grill, however, also had a weather eye looking out for trouble, and at once made a complaint to the local authorities. Deputy Sheriff Bill White and Constable Twomey left yesterday morning on the trail of the precocious kids, but did not have far to go as they located the boys at Warren.

They were placed under arrest and brought back to Bisbee yesterday afternoon, being arraigned before Justice High. Both lads pleaded not guilty to the charge against them, and had their hearing set for 5 o'clock this afternoon.
