BALLINGER SHOT BY MAN HE THREATENED

GLOBE, Oct. 29.—According to information received in this city yesterday, "Red" Ballinger was shot and killed in Winkelman last Friday by T. C. Sailer, a grading contractor, who is well known in this city.

Although full details regarding the affair have not yet reached this city the killing is said to have been done in self defense.

Ballinger, it is said, worked for Sailer for some time on a construction gang which is building a new line of railroad in the Winkelman district. He was discharged a short time ago and it is said that he threatened to shoot Sailer on sight.

Friday the two men met on the street at Winkelman. Ballinger reached for his hip pocket as if to draw a revolver. It is reported, and Sailer immediately drew his own revolver and fired several shots. Ballinger died almost instantly.

That Sailer was apparently justified in shooting Ballinger is shown by the verdict at the coroner's inquest, held over the remains.

He was completely vindicated and released on his own recognizance.

Sailer telegraphed to the sheriff's office yesterday afternoon, concerning the shooting.

He stated that although he had been vindicated in his actions, by the coroner's jury, that he desired to have the matter investigated by the grand jury. He asked for information as to when this jury would be summoned.

Deputy Sheriff Eugene Shite also visited the scene of the shooting. He telegraphed to Sheriff Henry Thompson yesterday afternoon, to the effect that the shooting was done in self defense.
