

# Stock Markets, Railroads and Mining

## BIG DEAL IS ON ACCORDING TO REPORT

A big mining deal is about to be consummated in the Sonora River district and the Washington mine is to change hands as the result of a visit made to the property by James Kirk and Dr. L. D. Ricketts, according to a rumor reaching Bisbee yesterday. Just what the deal is to be is seemingly clouded.

The Washington property, which is located near Huepoc on the Sonora River adjoins the Phillipi mine, one of the best known properties in that portion of Sonora. Recently Dr. Ricketts, Mr. Kirk and James Douglas left Arizona for the property, giving out no word of the object of their visit other than that it might have something to do with a transfer.

Word was received Friday at Bisbee by an official that the party would return shortly and for him to have legal papers prepared for a transfer, but again no tidings of the contracting parties was given. As the Washington has been developed by Mr. Bostwick and associates largely through the aid of James Douglas, it is believed in some quarters that he has bought a controlling interest in the property after being satisfied as to its worth by an inspection conducted by Dr. Ricketts and Mr. Kirk.

Another version of the pending deal is that the C. & A. company is acquiring the property, which is considered a promising one.

### The Stock Markets

The close of the week leaves the market in a somewhat unsettled condition, although the demand for the

higher class of securities have been good. That there is still an unsettled condition is evident. Banks have increased their rates of interest, and also have called in loans, fearing that Great Britain may force some liquidation. The last few days of the week stocks have been better supported than for some time, especially in the copper shares. The advance in Amalgamated, North Butte, Butte Coal, Copper Range, were the features of the week, the list closing very firm. Whether we are on the verge of the opening of a good market, or if it is but slight profit taking, and forcing the market, is hard to tell. Copper shares are certainly due for an advance till the copper metal situation is readjusted.

The New York list shows evidence of some liquidation, although Steel common is being well supported and it is now talked of for a five per cent issue. Of the lower priced issues, Warrior is in fair demand, as well as San Rosalia. The former should have their certificates out within the coming fourteen days, when we might expect active trading. San Rosalia expects to get the report from the last car just shipped to El Paso, and from what I can understand it will be one of the best cars that the company has shipped.

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
