WELL KNOWN COLORED MAN FALLS VERY ILL

"FESTIFICATION BROWN" BECOMES VICTIM OF OLD AGE AND DISEASE.

"Festification Brown," George Howard, aged 78, one of the best known colored residents of Bisbee, is dangerously ill at his home on Chihuahua hill as the result of ailments incidental to advanced years. For nearly two days the old man lay in his cabin on Chihuahua hill alone and too ill to summon assistance. Yesterday to old negro was missed and one of his friends went to his home, finding him in a deplorable condition as the result of disease and neglect. Deputy Sheriff White and Constable McRae were notified and at once took steps looking toward his removal to the county hospital at Tombstone where he can receive the attention that his condition renders necessary. It is probable that he will be taken to the county seat either today or tomorrow. "Festification" is among the pioneers of Bisbee, having come to the territory as a soldier in the days before such a place as this was dreamed of. He has been almost a constant resident of the city since the first few houses were erected here and has many friends among the white people who will not allow him to want for attention.

EXPLORING PARTY GOES ON LONG TRIP TO ISLAND OF TIBURON

(By the Original Tangle.) The Bisbee-Tiburon Exploration expedition, which left Bisbee October 16th for the island of Tiburon, with the intentions of prospecting the island and the mainland, have not been heard from since they left Guaymas, and on this account there has been quite a bit of talk as to their safety. I wish to state that I have no fear of their being killed or captured by the Seri Indians, whom some magazine writers term as cannibals. Although the party has not been heard from since October 29th, this signifies nothing, as their intentions were to sail around the entire island, taking data of the geological conditions, then they were to land upon the island, taking data, photographs and samples of anything that resembled ore.

They were to spend six weeks after that the island known as the Guardian Angel was to be searched for its mineral wealth. I was promised that I should be notified of their doings and success about December 15th.

This notification will come by the way of Libertad, a mining camp some forty miles above the Tiburon Isle on the mainland.

Prof. Fayette A. Jones, a noted mining geologist of Albuquerque, N. M., is with the party and as he offered the Mexican government maps and data which he will collect, they agreed to furnish him with a military escort. But this was turned down with thanks by a vote of the party. So they left Guaymas in an eleven-ton sloop, of American build, which they purchased there, and they intend to keep the sloop with them in case of emergency in going after water or fleeing from any trouble which they may run into.

The entire party registered with Mr. Taylor, the American consul at Guaymas, and reported off for three months with a probability of extending it to four. In this case if they are not heard from it is up to the American consul for investigation.

The party is composed of good, strong and sober Western men, most of them have seen army and navy service with Uncle Sam and know something of frontier life.

Joe Beals, the captain of the expedition, is a true westerner, originally from Idaho. He was in the U. S. Marine service for five years and served three years in Philippine waters as a corporal in the marine corps. He has made Bisbee his home for the past five years and has drilled in both the single and double handed drilling contests in this city and Douglas. He was working at the Gardner shaft up to the time of his departure.

John Hagan better known as "New York," the chief navigator, is an old English tar who has sailed the waters under every flag and bears the tattoo marks of all nations, the legal ear-marks of a salt-water traveler. He has sailed to the far north several times; to the Isle of Borneo, the Fiji, Australasia, South Africa Central and South America, the Mediterranean, Japan, Russia, China and now to Tiburon. Hagan was working as a miner at the Holbrook when he joined the party.

Chester Kilgore is one of Kentucky's quiet and peaceful sons, born and raised in the Blue Ridge mountains where men are known to have no fear, even though they should meet a bunch of Uncle Sam's internal revenue scouts, roaming the hills in search of the moonshiners, etc. Chester has made Bisbee his home the past three years and was working at the Holbrook up to a few days before the expedition left.

Charles (Clint) Clendenen, the secretary of the party, is a son of the

Lone Star State and has been making Bisbee his home for a number of years. He was a member of the Y. M. C. A. and is wearing their emblem in the lap among the savages. Clint, as he is known, is a miner and was prospecting in the Holbrook. He is also a cow-puncher, bronco-buster and prospector.

William Torney, the other Bisbeeite in the crowd, is a western man who has followed the faithful donkey over hill and stream in search of mineral wealth for nearly 30 years, knows the art of making "sour dough bread" and boiling frijoles better than the inventor does.

J. A. Bateman, a member from Albuquerque, is a crack rifle shot, a pioneer adventurer, prospector, cowboy, miner soldier etc. and was picked out to accompany Prof. Jones from all his past acquaintances—and is a good one wherever you put him.

Prof. Fayette A. Jones, the commander-in-chief of the party, is a well known consulting mining engineer and mining geologist, born on a farm twenty miles from Kansas City Mo., in 1859.

From 1884 to 1889 he was city engineer of Independence, Mo., and deputy county surveyor of Jackson county from 1884 to 1888. From '89 to '92 he was a student of the Missouri School of Mines, a portion of that time being also assistant professor of engineering and mathematics, graduating at the head of his class, making degrees in civil engineering and both metallurgical work. In 1894 and 1895 he was engineer in charge of an expedition across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, and from '96 to '98 was government assayer in charge of foreign ores at the port of Kansas City. During this time he acted in addition as chemist of the state geological survey of Missouri. It was from '98 to 1902 that Prof. Jones was president of the New Mexico School of Mines at Socorro, during the last year there being appointed field assistant of the United States Geological Survey, and then he had charge of the mineral resources of New Mexico as a member of the survey, making his headquarters at Albuquerque. As a member of the New Mexico board of managers for the Louisiana Purchase exposition, he gathered the mineral exhibit and compiled in the column known as "New Mexico's Mines and Minerals," 1904 World's Fair edition covering the mining history of the territory.

In 1909 he was solicited to join the Bisbee-Tiburon Exploration expedition by the Original Tangle, and at a meeting of that party was elected

chief commander and treasurer, and in also chief historian, geologist, engineer, photographer, etc.

Upon the return of the party they will issue from the press an illustrated history of their wanderings, hardships and successes.

There is no need to fear for the future outcome of such an expedition, made up as it is of men composed of such past masters in their respective lines, ranging from scouting and Indian fighting to the "scribing," prospecting and analyzing ends of the game and they will succeed, despite the outcries of the wabbling pessimists.
