NEWSPAPER REPORTER DIES GENUINE HERO.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 8.—Cecil R. Karberg, a reporter on a San Diego newspaper, was carried out to sea and drowned at Laolla, seven miles from here, after rescuing Dorothy McGraw, 12 years old. Karberg was the first to notice that a current was carrying the child away from land. Calling for help, he swam to her and sustained her until she was caught by a stronger swimmer. Another father tried to save Karberg, but caught in the current, relinquished his hold and swam ashore with difficulty. Karberg was 29 years old.

NATIONAL SHERIFFS MEETING IN OMAHA.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 8.—The convention of the National Sheriff's association opened here today with nearly 100 sheriffs present. The session was given over chiefly to official and semi-official welcomes and to the preliminary work of organization. After the afternoon session the visiting sheriffs went sightseeing.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—President Taft received today a petition from a large number of citizens of Alabama urging him to retain Dr. Wiley in the office of chief of the bureau of chemistry. The petition recites that "Dr. Wiley has contributed more to the health of the people of the United States than any other man, and has rendered incalculable benefits to the whole country in his efforts to have the pure food and drugs act enforced."

DENIES REPORT ABOUT DISCHARGING WOMEN.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—Denial of the report that the passenger department of the Southern Pacific had issued an order prohibiting the employment in future of women because of the tendency on the part of women to work only until they are ready to wed made today by Chas. S. Fee, passenger traffic manager of the company. "Women always have been and always will be an important factor in the office of the passenger department of the railroad," said Fee, "and this company has no intention of employing men to take the places of women employes."

ALLEGED KIDNAPING PRACTICE CONDEMNED.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The process of "legal kidnaping," as in the labor cases of Meyer, Haywood and McNamara, was condemned by the senate select committee appointed to investigate the third degree methods of the police authorities of the United States, which was presented to the senate today by Senator Borah, on behalf of the committee.

The committee said the practice of hurrying accused men from one state to another without giving them an opportunity to be heard should be prevented by prohibiting extradition until after the lapse of a certain number of days or by some other effective plan.

FLOOD WATERS REcede IN STATE OF KANSAS.

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 8.—Reports from various points in the flooded districts of Kansas tonight show that the waters of the rivers, with the exception of the Solomon river, are receding. In southeastern Kansas and southwestern Missouri the danger is now said to have passed.

At Minneapolis and Delphos, Kansas, on the Solomon river, the water is still at a dangerous point and the drift wood and debris is piled high above the dams.

DOG TEAM WORLD JOURNEY STARTS IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 8.—Traveling around the world with a dog team for a wager of \$19,000, William Brown of St. John's, Newfoundland, arrived yesterday in Superior, having completed all of the trip except the distance between here and Newfoundland.

According to the terms of the wager, which was made with a sporting club of St. John's, Brown must go around the world with a dog team in five years. He left here on Christmas day, 1906, and he expects to cover the remainder of the distance in time to win his wager.

CADETS' PRANKS PUNISHED; MUST DRAG GUN DAILY.

WEST POINT, Aug. 8.—A night or two ago the reveille gun was removed from its place on the campus by some mischievous cadets and dragged through the company streets of the cadet camp.

This breach of discipline came to the attention of the authorities, whose investigation implicated seventeen cadets, who are being punished.

They are required to drag the heavy gun tandem fashion from the camp to the gunshed, a distance of half a mile, once every day until the close of camp on Aug. 23. In addition, the offenders are to walk punishment tours until Dec. 31, and during that time will be deprived of their customary liberties.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The Cramp Shipbuilding company of Philadelphia was the lowest bidder today for four 25 knot torpedo boat destroyers of 1,800 tons each, at \$700,000 each. Night boats are to be built. Some time will be required to ascertain which of the bids will be accepted.

WASHINGTON MINES COMPANY ACTIVE

Ideal Ores for Concentration Insure Big Success of Company

The Washington mines are among the best known properties in northern Sonora, Mexico. To date there has been spent in development of these properties the sum of \$35,000 and over 250,000 tons of copper ore, running from 3 to 5 per cent, has been blocked out, making the cost per ton of ore blocked 14 cents.

The Washington, both in its geological structure and in the character of its ores, greatly resembles the Pinalos mine of the Moctezuma Copper company, a Phelps Dodge property at Nazcapan, Sonora, Mexico.

The great advantage of properties of this class is the ideal character of the ores for concentration. A saving of from 80 to 85 per cent can be made with these ores against a saving of from 65 to 70 per cent of the disseminated coppers, the concentrates being at a premium at the smelter on account of the excess of sulphur and iron contents.

The Washington mines are near the properties of the Tranvaal Mining company, west of Campas. This company is vigorously prosecuting development work and has developed a large tonnage of both milling and smelting ores.

The general manager of the Union de Mexicanos railway has assured the mining companies and operators in this district that the continuation of their road will be rapidly completed to Arizpe. This will enable even the smallest operator to ship his product at a profit, as the terminus of the road is at Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico, where a cheap water rate prevails to any port in the world.

The Washington Mines Development company are placing a small block of stock, 10,000 shares, on the market, the proceeds to be used for the further development of the properties. As soon as the development work is well under way the stock will be placed on the eastern markets.

As the road work is completed for the opening and blocking of two more levels in the Bolivar mine, and one more level in the Washington mine, the management expects to double the

CLEVELAND, Aug. 8.—County Prosecutor Cline has forwarded to United States Senator Pomerene at the latter's formal request all details in connection with the city's raid on the artificial plant of the East Ohio Gas company and the positive claim now being made by city officials that the East Ohio company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil company, has been adulterating the artificial gas with cheaper natural gas.

In his letter to the prosecutor asking for detailed information Senator Pomerene said that he wanted the information for use in connection with his resolution instructing the department of justice to bring criminal prosecution against the officers of the Standard Oil company.
