## WIGGS EXCEEDED HIS JURISDICTION

Duncan School Teacher on the Carpet Charged with Love Making.

CLIFTON, Ariz., Sept. 13.—Charged in sworn affidavits with taking undue liberties with three young lady pupils, attending the public school of Duncan, and with hugging and kissing another pupil, while driving in the vicinity of Duncan a few days ago, Clarence Wiggs, principal of the Duncan schools, will have a hearing before the territorial board of education on September 15.

To all of the affidavits charging him with conduct unbecoming a gentleman and teacher Mr. Wiggs has entered a strong denial and has the support of the trustees of the district. When the charges were first preferred against him, Mr. Wiggs offered to resign, but the board of trustees refused to accept his resignation.

The affidavits were filed with the board of trustees by citizens of Duncan and when the board refused to accept the resignation of the principal the charges were placed in the hands of County Superintendent Aker, who forwarded them to the territorial board and a special meeting to hear the charges will be held by the board on September 15th at Phoenix.

The first affidavits were sworn to by Mr. Charles Sands and Mr. Charles Martin, both reputable citizens of Duncan. They alleged that they saw Wiggs and one of his young lady pupils, Miss Kathryn McClellan, riding in a buggy not long ago, about 5 p. m., and that the girl was seated in the lap of the principal of the schools, and that he was making love to his pupil in violent fashion with obscenity demonstrations.

Another set of affidavits were sworn to by Misses Stewart, Black and Canthen, young ladies attending the Duncan public schools. They make the statement, under oath, that Wiggs had been guilty during the last term of school in the Duncan district, of undue familiarity. That on more than one occasion he attempted to hug them and forced improper attentions and advances upon them. Miss Forest Stewart, one of the girls who swore to the above charges, is a young lady eighteen years of age and the other girls are all in their teens.

**Huachuca Peaches.**  
Mr. and Mrs. J. H. James returned yesterday from a vacation of a week in the Huachuca. Mr. James described an industry there, the extent of which will be surprising to those who think of that region only as a mining and grazing country. Large areas are planted to peaches and this year the crop has been extraordinarily heavy. **MEXICAN REVOLUTION**

## AN OILMEN'S CONFLICT

Senor Gomez is Threatening to Tell What He Knows About It.

MEXICO CITY, Mexico, Sept. 12.—Dr. Francisco Vasquez Gomez is expected to explode the big political bomb when he makes public certain papers in connection with the revolution. While the minister of public instruction has not given an intimation as to the character of these papers, it is asserted by those who profess to have inside information that the documents in possession of Dr. Vasquez Gomez will show that the finances which were necessary to the life of the revolution were supplied by the Standard Oil interests in the United States, and the inference is made that the expected return was that the Agulla Oil company would be forced not only to buck the strong rival, Waters, Pierce Oil company, but a hostile government as well.

Lord Cowdray, who was Sir Westman Pearson, had been granted oil concessions in the country covering in one instance an entire state so far as the public lands were concerned. The current history behind the whole move is that in the fight for the oil business of the republic, the Agulla company, Lord Cowdray's company, had a big advantage because it was producing crude and refining it in this country and had the protection of the tariff, which each barrel of crude oil has to pay on entering the country.

One of the local papers published a scarehead story saying that the Waters Pierce interests had been maintaining a press bureau in this city and that articles which had appeared in certain newspapers in the United States had been inspired. The general tone of the articles was to the effect that Madero, when president, would make things hot for the Pearson interests and El Agulla Oil company in particular, and that the Pearson concessions, alleged to contain articles granting most unreasonable rights to the holder, would be searched for illegal clauses, in fact, that the government would wage a war against the company.

Man and the Crowd.  
An address once made by President Schurman to the graduating class at Cornell was an eloquent appeal for the individual against the crowd. "Would you abolish poverty, would you advance civilization?" he asked. "Then educate individuals one by one to be more virtuous, more intelligent, more skillful, more industrious."

Upon the soundness of the plea there will be general agreement. It is but a new statement of the philosophy of Jesus that each man should take care of his own soul. But it is a creed that has been much more successfully taught on lonely farms and pastures than in universities.

Still, the creed is a good one to teach. It can never be taught too often. Better than all laws against vice and crime and folly is an impulse toward self-reform. And perhaps such an impulse was never more needed than now, for never was the voice of the crowd more clamorous nor the influence of the crowd more potent. He that can make sure of his own thought amid its noises is a philosopher. He that can stand against its power is a hero.—New York World.
