HUSSEN ELUSIVE SAYS AL KETCHEL

He Has No Hope of Getting Tombstone Man on the Mat

Al Ketchel declared yesterday that there was no chance of getting a match with Ed Hussen and that he would only remain in Bisbee for two weeks before going on to Los Angeles to go into training for the prize ring game. He said that he had offered to wrestle Hussen with no side bet and to split the gate receipts with him and when Hussen said that he would wrestle only under those conditions or for a side bet of \$1,000, Ketchel offered to wrestle either for a split of the gate money or for a side bet of \$1,000. Neither arrangement was agreed to however by Hussen.

Ketchel said that he felt that the fans of the game in the county were due a return match as well as himself. Many of them saw the match at Tombstone, where the match went two hours without a fall and Hussen asked that the match be declared a draw. Hussen then promised a return match at Bisbee and the fans have been waiting all the summer to see this star event. However, all must agree that it is not Ketchel's fault that the return match has not been wrestled.

There may be something doing in the way of a go between Roberts, formerly of Tucson, and Ketchel. Some time ago Roberts said that he would wrestle Ketchel but that he was not willing to train off his excess weight. Ketchel says that this will not be necessary, as he will take Roberts on at catch weight. Last night Al Ketchel telephoned to the Review office a challenge to Roberts, who is now employed in the mines of this district. He offers to meet Roberts a week from tonight for a side bet of \$50 and the best gate arrangements obtainable. Catch as catch can rules are to prevail and the men go on at catch weights. If Roberts is in condition for this match and sees fit to accept the challenge the fans will see a good go between two clever men.

LITTLE GOOD MATERIAL FOR FOOT-BALL TEAM

Most of the High School Boys Are Lacking in Weight

The chances for getting out a championship football team at the High school are said to be very slim this year. A number of the players of last year and previous years are not in school this season by reason of graduating and other methods of thinking out. There are plenty of candidates offering but the majority of them are light and inexperienced. Owing to these conditions the schedule of the season of 1911 will not be very ambitious, it is said. A series of games will be arranged with the Douglas High school but at present games with other teams are not contemplated. There will be the customary inter-class and inter-school games among the juniors.

The end that will be tried for this year is a light, quick machine to carry the High school colors for the season and laying foundation for the following seasons. With the handicap of not having any heavy players, the team should be able to make a showing against its opponents, especially in the open-city play.

The coaching will be done again this year by Pat Henry, who has trained the high school teams for several seasons past. The candidates for team positions are at present doing preliminary work principally, such as putting, catching punts, the correct way of grappling the oval, passing and snapping. A good spirit is mixed with the practice work and that holds good for the team that will represent the school. It is by long odds too early to be thinking of accolades. FRANK SHATTUCK HAS VERY NARROW ESCAPE

Son of Bisbee Mining Man Is Struck By Street Car in Douglas

While in Douglas yesterday with his father, L. C. Shattuck, Frank Shattuck had an escape from death or serious maiming that is little short of miraculous, being struck by a street car, carried on its fender and then being pushed along by its wheels, yet escaping with no serious injury beyond the shock and nervousness consequent upon such an experience.

L. C. Shattuck and his son Frank went to Douglas yesterday and found the weather blustery and gusty, a valley windstorm prevailing. As they were driving along G avenue a sudden gust of wind caught the hat of Frank Shattuck from his head and it hit on the car track in the street. Mr. Shattuck stopped his vehicle, and as it was slowing up his son hastily leaped from the automobile upon the track, not noticing a fast approaching street car. He was struck by the car and carried along on its fender for half a block, while bystanders looked on, horror stricken. As the car slowed up young Shattuck rolled from the fender which passed over his prostrate body till the wheels of the slowly moving car were against him. By these wheels he was pushed along over the track for a short distance before the car was brought to a full stop. Then the boy was rescued from under the fender and it was found that he had escaped with a few scratches and bruises. To the onlookers his escape appeared to be inexplicable.
