

BRITISHER ON VISIT TO MABABI RANCH

J. Thompson Paxton Connected With Owing Syndicate Sees Property

J. Thompson Paxton, of London, England, was in the city yesterday, having arrived on Saturday from Hacienda Mababi, which is the head quarter ranch of the "Lot No. 4," south of Douglas in Sonora, a vast estate which includes timber, agriculture and grazing lands, says the Douglas International. The Aberdeen company, of San Francisco, who had charge of this property recently have retired from the management and Mr. Paxton expects to give his personal attention to large developments of the property. He left Douglas yesterday for his home in London and will bring his family to his Sonora possession.

Mr. Paxton stated yesterday that he was now having a comfortable residence built at Hacienda Mababi, which he will occupy with his family on his return from England.

A small saw mill has already been put in operation on the timber tract of land contained in the estate and this year considerable land was cleared and planted to crops for the first time.

The intention is to put cattle on the grazing land, but just when this will occur Mr. Paxton could not say yesterday, remarking that time was required for the study of the possibilities of the estate, but he said that the purpose was to cut and market timber, utilize the grazing land for raising stock and put the available agricultural land in cultivation, but would require time to accomplish all this.

This estate was purchased last year from the Bank of Sonora, which had acquired the property as a result of making a large loan and taking it as security. Mr. Paxton is one of the directors of the company owning the property, organized under the name of the Sonora Land & Timber Company, Limited.

WOLVES CHASE DEER IN CITY

Quarry Escapes, But Its Body is Later Found Outside Anaconda

ANACONDA, Nov. 7.—A band of timber wolves chased a large deer into Anaconda early this morning. The deer escaped after a desperate resistance, repeatedly turning his antlers upon the pursuing pack. Persons aroused by the disturbance took several shots at the wolves without effect.

Later the partially devoured carcass of the deer was found in one of the suburbs of the city. The wolves had cornered its quarry in a clump of brush. This is the first time that any game animal has been killed within the city limits by a wolf or other wild beast.

Wolves have been unusually numerous in this section of the state since the cold weather set in. It is believed that they are drifting in from the foot hills and plains in search for sheep, with which the mountain valley ranches are filled.

Chief Stockholder of Utah Copper Company Receives Royal Income

COLORADO, SPRINGS, Colo., Nov. 6.—The total net profit of the Utah Copper company for the quarter ending Sept. 30 was \$1,538,715.55, including \$375,178.50 received from the Nevada Consolidated Copper company and \$12,992.61 received from miscellaneous sources other than ore production, according to the fourteenth quarterly report just issued by Charles M. MacNeill of this city. Mr. MacNeill is, in addition to being president of the company, the largest stockholder, and it is said that his income from the Utah Copper company alone amounts to \$1,000,000 a year.

The total production for the Utah company alone for the last quarter was \$5,831,406 pounds of copper, which sold on a basis of 12 1/2 cents a pound, as compared with the total amount for the preceding quarter of 21,469,812 pounds.

The average cost per pound of the copper produced was extremely low being only 12 cents, as compared with 8 1/2 cents for the preceding quarter, which was a low mark of 7 1/2 cents a pound. In the last three months the average monthly production has increased more than 1,500,000 pounds over the average for the first three months of the year.

In August the Bingham & Garfield railway was completed for hauling ore from the mines to the mills, and in September a new schedule was effected with the Denver & Rio Grande, by which the latter road will haul 7,500 tons a day. An excess of that amount will be handled by the Bingham & Garfield road.

Of the ore treated 24 per cent came from the underground workings and 76 per cent from the surface, mined by steam shovels. The company now has a daily ore treatment capacity of 20,000 tons.

VILJOEN MEETS WITH CHIEFS OF YAQUIS

Commissioner Believes That Rumors of Disaffection Are Unfounded

GUAYMAS, Son., Nov. 7.—Gen. B. J. Viljoen and his secretary, H. V. Anaya, have returned from the Yaqui country where they went to confer with the Yaqui chiefs in regard to the peace treaty. In an interview the general says: "I was on my way to Empalme and was stopping a day in Hermosillo, when Governor Mayorena, who is in Guaymas, telegraphed me that there were 200 Indians at Cruz de Piedra, who had come down for supplies, and he thought it would be well for me to come here, immediately. I came to Empalme where the governor met me and we talked with the chiefs, telling them of the difficulty in getting food supply, of the high prices still obtaining, caused by the interruption of train service. The Indians, however, were all supplied with food the next morning, and went back to the mountains rejoicing.

Several of the chiefs told us that they were peacefully inclined, and were anxious to settle down, but one of the chiefs, who has quite a following in the mountains, had but little to say and seemed rather sullen. However, we are pressing forward with peace negotiations, and they have since that time about Nov. 10. There are confusing rumors about suspicious movements of the Yaquis and the state government has been warned against a surprise. Even the general of this zone is somewhat disturbed, but personally I cannot see any reason for this. We find some obstruction in our work by outsiders who are interfering in a driving advice continually against a peaceful settlement. I feel confident that if I were alone and the bad influences which are at work would cease we would succeed in settling the old question for a time."

BEARS SUFFER WHEN MARKETS HOLD FIRM

Short Interest in Wall Street Is Reported to be in Bad Position

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Under the lead of standard railroad issues, stocks advanced again today. The movement was preceded by a period of hesitation in the early trading when a majority of active stocks sagged below Saturday's close. Active buying then lifted the market and during the remainder of the session prices held firm. Heavy realizing kept the market in check. Stocks were supplied plentifully on the advance, but selling ceased when the market showed signs of weakening. It is assumed that large holders are taking advantage of the rise to reduce their holdings.

The short interest is reported to have met serious reverses. Large stop loss orders, especially in United States Steel, have been uncovered on the advance and the attack on the bears was carried on with success today.

Northwestern railroads are conspicuous in point of strength. Trading in those roads increased owing to reports of stimulation of business due to the crop movement.

Among the eastern roads, Reading, Lehigh, Pennsylvania, Baltimore and Ohio stood out prominently with gains of a point or more. The latter crossed part for the first time in several weeks.

Specialties were in the background today, though General Electric, Harvester and Blacut made good gains. United States Steel rose above six, the highest point since the filing of the government's dissolution suit. Bonds were firm. Total sales, par value, \$4,997,500. Governments unchanged.

INVESTIGATION IS ORDERED

PRAYERS FOR SELF GOING UP TO HEAVEN

They are not to be considered. It is too sacred a thing to be discussed with those whose code of action has anything to do with the balance of trade. To such the Declaration of Independence is worthy only of dreamers.

Possession is Menace. Declaring the Philippines a source of national weakness to the United States, the commissioner continued: "They are costing you—they have cost you—hundreds of millions of dollars, and not one single cent in return has found its way into any American pocket which is bearing any share of the burden of this expense. A few men of your country are the only ones actually deriving any pecuniary profit from the enterprise. As a business proposition, therefore, or as a matter of national gain to the United States, the Philippines are, as Congressman Foster stated a 'lemon'."

"I cannot, of course, help respecting and admiring the American people. Men who, for the sake of what they believe to be the cause of universal advancement and civilization, for the sake of what they believe to be the good of a foreign people—induce their country to make any sacrifices, and especially that of life, are enough to command the admiration of everybody, including even their bitterest opponents. Nevertheless, I must say that in my opinion, in the opinion of the great majority of Filipinos, they are wrong."

"The consent of the governed is the basis of all just government, says the American Declaration. How can anybody maintain that any country on the face of the earth, and particularly this country, no matter how attractive its motive, has the right to impose by force its government upon another? It is in utter contradiction of the letter and spirit of the Declaration of Independence. That our people are not willingly under your control is a matter of history. In fact, they would not accept any foreign domination if they could help it."

They revolted against Spain, and declared the independence of the Philippines just as your forefathers declared the independence of the thirteen colonies. They organized a republican government, which refused to accept the sovereignty of the United States, and backed by all the people of the Archipelago, offered armed resistance, and maintained it until our troops were almost completely annihilated by your superior numbers. Ask any Filipino today what he wishes most, and he will answer "freedom for his country."

Words of Admiral Dewey and General Merritt, who commanded the American forces in the Philippines in 1898, were quoted by Commissioner Quezon to show that his people were better fitted for self-government than the Cubans.

Appeals to Americans. Appealing to the Americans, Quezon continued: "I wish to touch upon a phase of this big question, which I consider the paramount importance of the American people themselves. It is possible that the spirit which inspired Patrick Henry to say: 'Give me liberty or give me death,' no longer animates your people? Are you regardless of opinions or sentiment as to how foreign people should be treated, still unanimous in your future for republican government and republican institutions? Do you wish this government of yours to continue to be a government of the people, by the people, for the people. Do you expect to be sovereigns of this country, and to have the officials to be mere executors of your will? If so

You cannot, without being untrue to yourselves, continue to celebrate year after year the Declaration of independence, thus reaffirming its doctrines, and at the same time pursue a policy in the Philippines which is flagrantly in contradiction to these doctrines. You must either confess your fathers erred in revolting against England or withdraw your authority over our country.
