## DOUGLAS ANXIOUS TO SHOW NO EPIDEMIC

Chamber of Commerce Secretary Telegraphs of Present Status

The Review is in receipt of a telegram from Secretary E. P. Grindell, of the Douglas chamber of commerce and mines, epitomizing the small pox situation at Douglas. As far as Bisbee is concerned, there is no alarm felt over the Douglas situation, and Bisbee people have been kept informed daily of the situation there by the city and county health authorities through the medium of The Review. They have accepted it as a fact that all possible measures were being taken by county authorities and by city health authorities of Bisbee and Douglas, have (many of them) been vaccinated and gone on about their affairs. The health authorities feel that there can be no such thing as undue publicity in the matter of conserving and protecting the public health.  
The telegram follows:  
Douglas, Ariz., March 15, Editor of Review.  
Nineteen is the total of small pox cases in Douglas. All are in the detention hospital, and no new cases have developed in seven days. There has been a total of seven deaths. All cases came from one source, supposedly from a Sonora border town. There have been many cases of small pox in all border towns for many months. There is no occasion for the present scare reports relative to Douglas. The disease is now under control, and is dying out. The fact that Douglas is using every precaution, and that citizens are aiding in stamping out the disease has given undue publicity in the matter. Schools and all public houses will open Monday.

## BORDERLAND HIGHWAY PROJECT WILL BE BROUGHT TO A FOCUS

Chairman of Transcontinental Club Will Himself Make Tour and Attend to Organizing Association Along the Entire Line of the Proposed Route About the End of Month.

H. C. Drum, chairman of the tour of the Transcontinental Club, of Chicago, will be in Bisbee the latter part of March or the first of April. He will make the auto trip over the Borderland highway from Dodge City, Kansas, to Phoenix, at the request of cities along the southwestern border, which are interested in having the transcontinental highway take the "borderland route."  
E. P. Grindell, secretary of the Douglas chamber of commerce and mines, who has been instrumental in having the Transcontinental Club chairman come and inspect this route, stated to The Review last night over long distance telephone, that he had not been informed of the date on which Mr. Drum would arrive, but that he would communicate this information to the Warren District Commercial club as soon as he learned it. Mr. Grindell received a letter from Mr. Drum yesterday afternoon stating that he would leave Chicago on March 29 or April 1. The El Paso chamber of commerce which is also working for the Borderland route for the highway has it that he will leave Chicago on March 29.  
**Will Organize Association**  
Dr. Drum will organize the Borderland Route association to pull for the southern route for the transcontinental highway. This organization will be formed upon the arrival of the route man at El Paso and a number of Douglas highway boosters will attend the meeting. While Mr. Drum will go over the highway in person, Mr. Grindell suggests that it will be a good idea for Bisbee and Douglas to have representatives at the El Paso meeting, and has made the suggestion to the Commercial club that this organization have one or more representatives at the meeting, going with the Douglas party.  
The headquarters of the Borderland Route association will probably be at El Paso, that being the largest city on the proposed route, and the president will probably be selected from the boosters of that city. The route will be divided into districts and there will be a vice president for each district. The first district will embrace jurisdiction over that part of the route between Dodge City and Plainsville, Texas, the second between Plainsville and El Paso, and the third between El Paso and Phoenix, embracing the territory between El Paso, Rodeo, Douglas, Bisbee, Tucson, Florence and Phoenix. Under each vice president will be a superintendent of roads.  
It was first stated that the chairman of the transcontinental tour club would send a representative, but the latest information is that Drum himself will make the trip, which is good news to the boosters of the Borderland Route.  
**General Enthusiasm Prevails**  
From all along the Borderland route comes encouraging news of enthusiasm. Mr. Grindell stated last night the Texas towns on the route, Plainsville, Amarillo and others, were quite as enthusiastic for the route as are the Arizona and New Mexico towns. President H. D. McVay returned yesterday from a trip to Tucson, and there he found the commercial club enthusiastically ready to do all in their power for the adoption of the Borderland route.  
Secretary Grindell says that the opportunity of securing the routings of the transcontinental club is the biggest chance that has ever knocked

## LAND OWNERS DECIDE ON UNIFORM ACTION

Bisbee Will Unite with the Douglas People as to Lost Hills  
Last evening those who are interested in the Lost Hills country, or at least a large number of them, met at the city hall and considered ways and means of best protecting their holdings from claim jumpers, if all should be struck in the district where the Arizona Oil company, composed chiefly of Bisbee and Douglas capital, is now sinking a well. A large number of the interested ones were present, and the matter was thoroughly discussed, following which it was decided to affiliate with the association which was formed at Douglas last week. A committee of three, to represent the Bisbee members, was selected, consisting of George Long, Jack McGregor and Billy Robinson.  
When it was reported from the Lost Hills about a week ago that the drill was in shale and that there was a strong odor of gas, steps were at once taken in Douglas by some of those who are interested in the Lost Hills district to organize for mutual protection. Nothing was done in this city until later, when the meeting held at the city hall last night was called, and the result is a material strengthening of the land owners' organization, of which Shelton G. Dowell, of Douglas, is the president.
