PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 31.—Star athletes representing more than a score of the leading American colleges and universities lined up on Franklin field this afternoon for the preliminaries in the 27th annual championship track and field meet of the Intercollegiate Athletic association. Tomorrow the final events to determine the titles will be held. Harvard, Cornell, Pennsylvania and Yale all have strong, well rounded pit teams, and all indications point to keen and close competitions for the championships. Numerous other colleges are represented by individual stars that are expected to shine brilliantly in some of the various events.



ATTACHED AUTO HAS DISAPPEARED

Officer C. N. Thomas returned Thursday evening from Douglas, where he went in search of an automobile that had been taken out of town during a lapse of legal procedure. He was unable to find it, however, and it is believed that it was taken out of the state and beyond the jurisdiction of Arizona officers.

The machine was an auto truck that was seized Monday by Deputy Sheriff Alie Howe of Tombstone under an order of the superior court and turned over to the El Paso & Southwestern railroad, which had a claim of \$750 on the machine. The auto was then in the possession of J. H. Jack. Following that action Jack sued out a writ of attachment on the auto and it was attached by Officer C. N. Thomas while it was at the Southwestern freight warehouse.

In giving bond on the attachment it is said that Jack failed to secure the proper number of sureties. While the officer was arranging through Jack for bond in the sum of \$1,500 before he took possession of the auto, the machine was put aboard a freight car, it is said and taken out of town and out of the jurisdiction of state officers. The bond of \$1,500 was for the protection of the officer's bondsmen and was double the amount of the Southwestern claim of \$750.
