

CRUSHED SLAG ROAD IS PLAN

Council May Try Experiment in Street Paving; Oiling Naco Road Data

MEETING TONIGHT

The city council will hold a special meeting this evening at eight o'clock to consider the proposition of oiling Naco road from the eastern city limits to the fire house. Chairman J. W. Kinney, of the street committee, has been gathering data on this matter for some time, and he is now ready to submit this information to the council.

It is deemed advisable to take the matter up at this time as the oiling outfit of Scott and Adamson, of Douglas, is in the district, and will be here for two weeks. Those who favor oiling Naco road in the city limits believe that a more favorable bid may be obtained from the contractors if it is set now while their outfit is here.

The cost of oiling this part of the road will be approximately \$2,000, using the per yard cost to the county for the work now being done between Lowell and the city limits of Bisbee. There are 6,000 square yards of road surface between the city limits and the point of beginning of the brick pavement in front of the city hall, and the county work as being done for 28 1/4 cents per square yard. If this work is done it will give the people an oiled road from Bisbee to Douglas.

Figures and estimates will also be furnished by Chairman Kinney, of the street committee, on the cost of oiling Tombstone canyon. The road surface from Main street to the end of the car line in the canyon is 25,000 square yards and from that point to the western city limits 12,000 square yards, making a total of 37,000 square yards. Of this total, however, 4,700 square yards is occupied by the street railway company, and would be paid for by that company, leaving a total of 32,300 to be paid for by the city at the rate, probably, of 28 1/4 cents per square yard. Chairman Kinney estimates that the road through the canyon, from the eastern to the western city limits, could be oiled for \$10,000.

Before making this outlay for oiling, however, Chairman Kinney and others in the council favor making an experiment with paving materials and the matter of making a test of crushed slag, from the slag dump, as a paving material, will be suggested by the street committee. The road through the city between the depot and the west corner of the Phelps Dodge store will be suggested as a suitable place for making the test, and it is understood that business men interested are willing to contribute to the cost of this piece of work.

This section of street is a place where the wear and tear on the paving could be easily watched, and if it proved satisfactory, it might be more acceptable to the people of the canyon in the residence districts, than oiling, which is better adapted to business streets. The length of this section proposed for the test is 860 square yards.

Figures on the cost of bitulithic paving will also be submitted. Chairman Kinney having obtained data from cities all over the southwest that have used this as a paving material. The cost of bitulithic paving at Phoenix was \$2.15 per square yard; \$2.20 at El Paso and \$2.10 at Albuquerque. An El Paso firm of contractors is said to be ready to bid \$1.85 on the Bisbee work.

An estimate on the cost of paving Naco road from the eastern city limits to the city hall is \$24,750 at the Phoenix rate, though it would be considerably less at the rate offered by the El Paso firm.

All those who are interested in the matter of oiling or paving the streets are invited to attend the meeting tonight, and they will be given an opportunity to express themselves on the matter.

KINNEY FAVORITE IN ROPE CONTEST

There will be a gathering of cowboys here on that day, and all of them will be prepared to back the Arizona champion.

Goats will be the goats of the contest. The rider roping and tying five wild goats the quickest will be the winner of the championship and the side bet as well. Five wild steers will also be ridden by cowboys, there will be a relay race, and Dick Hays will rope a steer from an automobile without throwing it. Jim Kinney will perform in riding a wild outlaw broncho.

SECRET ASTOR SAFE MELTED OPEN

The late Col. John Jacob Astor possessed one safe of which only he knew the combination, and there is absolutely secured from fire and burglars, reposed such secrets of affairs or fortune as he desired to conceal from his most intimate confidant.

The strong box which was hardened to the point of resistance even to electrical contact, had reposed for several years in the personal office of Col. Astor. Only he knew the combination and until recently his executors were unable to open it. Experts worked in vain as did steel drill men.

NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTIONS

ST. JOHN, N. B., June 20.—The elections throughout New Brunswick are today expressing their political preferences and on their verdict depends the fate of the Conservative government, which, under the leadership of J. K. Flemming and previously under J. D. Hazen, whom Mr. Flemming succeeded when the former entered the Dominion cabinet, has been in office for four years. The campaign has been a rather spirited one, the opposition putting up candidates in practically every constituency. In its campaign for a renewal of its power the government points to the success of its policies for the encouragement of industry and the development of the natural resources of the Province.

The opposition leaders have confined themselves principally to a criticism of the government's handling of the finances. The general opinion is that while the opposition may win one or two seats from the government, they are likely to lose at least an equal number of seats held in the last legislature, so that the government will come out of the contest as strong as ever.

COMMENCEMENT AT HARVARD

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 20.—America's oldest colonial institution, Harvard University, today closed its 276th year, graduating a class of more than 500 students. The commencement was accompanied by all the exercises and ceremonies that the custom of years has established for the occasion. The features of the day included the gathering at the Massachusetts hall of the president and fellows, overseers, faculties and invited guests and alumni of the university, the march to Sanders Theater, where the graduating exercises were held, and finally the meeting of the alumni association. As in former years, the exercises of the day and the processions to Sanders Theater and Memorial hall were in charge of the class that is celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of its graduation this year, the class of 1887 having the honor.

MEETING OF FLORIDA EDITORS

PALATKA, Fla., June 20.—Many newspaper editors and publishers gathered here today for the annual meeting of the Florida Press association. Cost and advertising are the principal subjects stated for discussion at the meeting, which will continue over tomorrow. F. Ross McCormack of Life Oak is the president of the association and T. I. Appleyard of Tallahassee is the secretary.

FARMER ELEVATOR MANAGERS

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 19.—Plans to extend the movement for cooperative marketing of farm products are to be exhaustively discussed by the National association of managers of farmers' elevator companies, which met in this city today for a three days' convention. One hundred and fifty thousand members of farmers' co-operative organizations in Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North and South Dakota and Montana are represented at the meeting, which is the largest and most representative of its kind ever held in the northwest. Western Canada also has sent delegates to the convention. According to the reports to be presented to the convention the farmers' elevators are now handling 65 per cent of the grain shipped from the Northwest. Numerous other commodities are also handled by the co-operative organizations.
