

# PROSPERITY BEAMS AGAIN ON SALT LAKE

**\$1,100,000 Worth of New Equipment Ordered for Denver and Rio Grande Road**

One million, one hundred thousand dollars worth of new equipment for the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company has been ordered and contracts signed, all to be delivered within ninety days. This additional equipment is in part for new equipment to enable the company to cope with the increased demand, experienced in the departments in Utah and Colorado.

A telegram was received yesterday by Colonel L. A. Benton, general agent, passenger department, to the effect that Vice President Brown had awarded to various manufacturers for delivery within ninety days contracts for 700 box cars, 100 stock cars, 250 all-steel coal cars and 50 cabooses, costing in the aggregate \$1,100,000.

The management of the Rio Grande has obtained appropriations for improvements from the executive department of the road that are greatly in excess of the amount ordinarily required for maintenance operating and other expenses. In explanation of this Colonel Benton said:

"Our road is not on any boom proportion. Our earnings have been creditable and we are now preparing to meet the exigencies of the great strides made by the people along our lines. There is every indication of a vast revival of agricultural and other interests surrounding Salt Lake and with this new equipment added to what we now have we will be able to compete with the demands of the country from a traffic standpoint."

**Business Necessitates Purchase**  
S. V. Derrah, assistant general freight agent, when asked why this additional equipment was necessary, said:

"The increase in our business necessitates these facilities. This country is rapidly filling up. New settlers are coming into this state every day and we anticipate a larger volume of business than ever.

"Railroad companies do not make expenditures, as a rule, unless conditions warrant. Power and equipment are required to move freight and properly take care of the traffic. Our business shows a substantial increase every month.

"This equipment now under contract will be distributed over the entire system. Generally speaking, more equipment requires additional working force. All of this is simply in line with the general plan of improvements as outlined. The double-tracking of road-beds and other work being performed by the engineering and construction departments will when completed allow us to handle more equipment."

In railroad circles the enormous amounts appropriated this fiscal year by railroads in this and other sections of the country for improvements are looked upon as strong evidence of a return of good times.—Salt Lake Herald Republican.



**MARRIED IN BALLOON KAW TOWN COUPLE HONEYMOON IN AIR**  
Elimination Race for Right to Contest in Germany for James Gordon Bennett Trophy Starts

KANSAS CITY, July 27.—Promptly at five o'clock this afternoon the pilot balloon and the Kansas City, with a third not a contestant, rose in the air and sailed off northwest, in the great elimination race to determine America's representative international balloon for the race with Germany, next fall, for the James Gordon Bennett trophy. The pilot balloon was followed at 10 minutes' intervals by six racers, all taking the same course.

In a strong wind, a few moments before the pilot balloon started, Dr. M. E. Hartman and Miss Violet Davis, both of Kansas City, stood in the basket of the gas bag and were married. After a whoop given by the big crowd, the guy ropes were cut and with Captain Jacobs as pilot, the two sailed away on their honeymoon.

As St. Louis IV was ready to start, the official starter noticed a tip in the bag, caused by a heavy guy wire. He would not allow the balloon to rise, and it was withdrawn. At 7:30, two bugs, the Cole and an unknown, pushed over St. Joseph, high in the air, going rapidly northwest.
