## Any One Here Seen the Rebels TRY THIS ON YOUR PIANO Washington Saw 'Em Here

Band of 200 Arrives; U. S. Soldiers to Rescue; American Consul at Nogales Had a Dream; Notices War Department; Red Headed Paper Falls for 'Pipe'; Bisbeeites Fail to Note Visit

Go away from home to get the news is an old adage. Usually that news is unauthentic, often fabricated, sometimes amusing. All of this is the case with an article published in the El Paso Herald, which reads: Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.—The sudden appearance at Bisbee, Ariz., last night, of about 200 Mexican rebels has sent a detachment of American troops along the line from the eastward to that point. If the rebels have not retreated across the line

when the troops arrive, they will probably be arrested.

The news came to the state department from the American consul at Nogales, and is regarded as confirmation of the report that the rebel forces are rapidly disintegrating.

This was news indeed, for no one in Bisbee had any idea that there had been a force of Mexican rebels within a hundred miles of the city. So far during the trouble, Bisbee has had to permit her younger sister, Douglas, to occupy the lime light of the war stage and the sudden transition from spectator to leading lady and center of the stage was at least disquieting. But there it is on the front page of the El Paso paper, under a headline printed in gory red. A force of 200 Mexican rebels in Bisbee! And nobody knew anything about it. Not a merchant can be found who has sold any uniforms, shoes, arms or cartridges to these fierce and dreaded visitors. Not a restaurant will admit having served them at his table. The shrewdness of the El Paso Herald is indeed, no one can be found who has seen the dust of their approach or departure.

It would be interesting to the people of Bisbee, who overlooked this one best bet to increase trade with Mexico, to learn whether the visiting army came via Tombstone and over the divide or whether they entered the city via Naco road. The reception committee should be censured for not meeting them, not calling out both hands and having a general celebration and parade. Possibly the El Paso Herald can inform the good people of this district who they are to blame for this oversight. It is true, such a visit was entirely unexpected in a city so far from the line and so located as is Bisbee, but the Washington correspondent may be a believer that it is always the unexpected that happens unexpectedly.

On all sides yesterday were heard expressions of regret that Bisbee had proved negligent in hospitality and that so important an event as an invasion of this city by a Mexican army of 200 should have escaped notice in the rush of other business and preparation for the approaching pay days.

Pall bearers will be selected two each from the Elks Lodge, Knights of Pythias and the Moose.

Indications are that a large party will leave Bisbee this morning since the deceased was a member of the Moose lodge here and although not a member of the Elks lodge or Knights Pythias in this city was a frequent attendant at the meetings of both lodges and was often about the Elks home. Both of those orders will have delegations present in Douglas today. Members of the ball teams of the Tri-Town league will also attend and many other friends will take the opportunity of the special train to be run home and pay final tribute to his memory.

Hence it was easy to smile and be sympathetic. "Where was the shooting in Bisbee? What about it?" were the queries put to Justice High yesterday forenoon when he answered the phone. "This is the first that I have heard of it," was his reply and he settled back in his chair puzzled as he hung up the telephone receiver.

A few minutes after the telephone message the deputy sheriff at Lowell came clattering up to the office of Justice High's court mounted on a sweating horse. ## STREET RAILWAY EXTENSION TO BEGIN THIS WEEK

Local Company Order Construction of Tombstone Canyon Line; Directors Act Voluntarily

Work of extending the street railway up Tombstone Canyon has been ordered started, and will be begun this week. The resolution authorizing the extension was passed at a meeting of the directors of the company held yesterday morning, and provides for the continuance of the line up to the Thomas place. It does not provide for construction to the present city line.

When the franchise was granted to the Warren Street Railway it provided for the extension of the line to the city limits. After the granting of the franchise, the city limits were extended to the present point, but the line at the time the franchise was granted is very different from that which was afterwards adopted. To extend to the line designated in the franchise would not require the work that is now contemplated, but the directors have gone beyond what they feel they are required to do because of a verbal promise that was made by Cleve Van Dyke when he was superintendent of the company. He agreed to extend beyond the then limits of the city to the Thomas place, and the directors felt that they were morally bound by the promise which he made at that time, whether it was authorized or not, and are now living up to it and carrying the line beyond the point which they consider their charter obligates them to.

When the last city council started on the extension of the Tombstone Canyon road, they appear to have gone on the surmise that the street railway must build to the present city limits. The stand taken by the company is that the terms of their franchise were clear when it was granted and named the point to which they must extend at an agreed upon time.

If the city limits were later changed, that had no effect upon the point to which they must build, any more than if the city limits should now be extended to the top of the divide would the company be compelled to build to the point selected as the municipal boundary. This is the stand that the company has taken, but they have done more than this, for they have agreed to extend beyond the point designated by the franchise and on to the point that was verbally promised by the then superintendent, thus doing more than they agreed to do in order to obtain a charter to run through the streets of the city.

There has been little or no demand for the extension of the line beyond the point selected as its end, and the building up of that section does not warrant going further, state the officials. They are ready to extend to points of population as fast as conditions and population warrant, but no such occasion can be found for extending to the present limits at this time, it is declared.
