Rancher May Have Been Captured by Rebels; Hunt Ranch Was Raided

The ranch of Stewart Hunt, a relative of Dr. C. H. Hunt, of this city, was raided by Mexican rebels several days ago. A number of cattle were killed, horses stolen and household goods carried away or destroyed. Mr. Hunt and others on the ranch learned of the approach of the rebels, and left the ranch on horseback, and have arrived at Douglas, Dr. Hunt learned yesterday. The saddle horses brought out were brought to this side of the line under bond. The ranch is located north of Nacozari, Sonora.

ZELAYA MAY HEAD NICARAGUA REVOLT

Deposed President Said to Be on Way to Country Where Revolution Is in Progress

PANAMA, Aug. 31.—Local newspapers today published a report that former president Zelaya of Nicaragua, whose government was overthrown in 1909, by a revolution headed by General Estrada had arrived at Colon on his way to Nicaragua. Inquiries at the Nicaraguan American legations failed to confirm the report.

Owing to the revolution in Nicaragua it is said the Pacific Mail Steamship company's vessels are not receiving cargoes at Nicaraguan ports.

Eight hundred marines, sent from Philadelphia on the transport Prairies for service at Nicaragua arrived at Balboa from Colon this afternoon. Tonight they are camping on the docks there. They will transfer their equipment to the cruiser California by tug and lighters tomorrow. The California arrived today but is remaining outside the bay as her captain, after consultation with port and Canal Zone authorities decided not to dock the vessel for fear she might touch bottom.

The Balboa docks resemble a large military camp with machine guns, their officers and the stacked arms of the men. There are also twelve box cars containing arms, ammunition, provisions and two protected automatic guns on a flat car.

Reliable information from Nicaragua received here today is to the effect that two American marines were killed there.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 31.—Wireless messages received at Point Loma say the gunboat vichiburg has left Guaymas and is on its way to Corinto. It has met no new mishap of any sort.

Near to Starvation
MANAGUA, Aug. 30.—Delayed in transmission Managua, Granada and Masaya are still being beleaguered. Inhabitants of the two latter towns must be nearing the point of starvation. In a letter which was smuggled out from Granada a woman wrote to her husband here begging that food be gotten through to the town. She reports conditions at Granada as terrible.

SAN JUAN DELSUR, Nic., Aug. 31.—Commander Thomas Washington of the United States cruiser Denver says all is going well between Corinto and Leon.

NEW COMMANDER WEST POINT
WEST POINT, N. Y., Aug. 31.—Col. C. P. Townley, recently in command of the Portland, Me., artillery district, today assumed the duties of superintendent of the United States Military Academy. Col. Townley succeeds Major General Thomas H. Barry, who was recently assigned to the command of the eastern division, with headquarters in New York.

QUAKE ROCKS GUADALAJARA
GUADALAJARA, Aug. 31.—Guadalajara was violently shaken by an earthquake at 5:35 this morning. The buildings in all parts of the city were cracking a wall. Seventeen high schools followed within two hours.

REGISTRATION BOOKS CLOSED; OPEN OCT. 15

Controversy as to Time Lists Should Remain Open Arises with Attorney General

Registration books in Cochise county closed yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock and will remain closed until September 17, when they will be reopened and registration for the November election will proceed until October 15, when they will close for the year. It will be impossible to tell how many voters registered until the middle of the week.

The registration books of Pima county closed Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock according to Tucson newspapers, which state that the county attorney of Pima county received a letter from Attorney General Bullard stating that the books should close on August 30 and not August 31. In Tucson, as in Bisbee, the impression prevailed that the books would remain open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon yesterday, August 31, but the opinion of the attorney general is contrary to this. Upon the receipt of the state attorney general's opinion, the Pima county recorder had hand bills printed and distributed, urging voters to register not later than Friday afternoon.

Registration books in this county were kept open until yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock upon instructions of County Recorder Owen E. Murphy.

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—Chicago's population is 2,326,400, according to a census made for a local city directory a gain of 62,216 over figures compiled by some concern one year ago.

SUN CULT LEADER TO THE BAR
CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—At the term of the federal court about to convene in this city, Ottoman Zar Adulsh Hanish, leader and founder of the Mazdaznan sun cult, will be called upon to face the bar of justice. Hanish was indicted by the grand jury some time ago on a charge of sending obscene literature, including the "Inner Studies," to a young woman in Brookfield, Mo. The indictment was voted after Richard E. Hanish, father of the cult head, had related the life story of his son. The father, an aged musician of Milwaukee, in poor circumstances, reared the cult leader's son of his birth. Hanish had led his followers to believe that he was born in Persia and reared in a monastery by followers of Zoroaster. Sensational testimony is expected at the trial. Among the followers of Hanish are said to be numerous women of social prominence in Chicago and in Montreal and Lowell, Mass., where branches of the Mazdaznan colony existed.

SUGAR PACT FAILS
BRUSSELS, Aug. 31.—Denouncement of the Brussels Sugar convention by several of more European nations is anticipated as a result of the example set by England and Italy. It is feared the approaching international conference will find difficulty in maintaining a pact by which the export of beet sugar from various countries is regulated.

LUNA'S DEATH ACCIDENTAL
ALBUQUERQUE, Aug. 31.—The body of Solomon Luna, republican national committee man of New Mexico who met death in a sheep dropping vat at his ranch yesterday was brought here today. After the inquest the coroner rendered a verdict of accidental death.

IT IS BELIEVED Luna fell into the vat while groping in the dark for a water faucet. The funeral will be held here Monday.

WOMAN WHO WOKE UP COUNTY SCHOOLS
In the September Woman's Home Companion appears an article about Miss Jessie Field who is superintendent of the county schools of Page County, Iowa, and has done great work. Following is an extract: "Miss Field's chosen task was to make the schools count for something; to wake up teachers, pupils, and parents; to improve the system of education without primarily increasing its cost. She found that the children were being taught in humdrum fashion from text-books that at the best might prepare them for commercial life in the cities. Why should a farmer's son and heir waste his time over arithmetical problems dealing with stocks and bonds when farm arithmetic, involving the same general principles, is so much more intelligible and interesting to him, and vastly more practical? With the aid of teachers and farmers Miss Field compiled a little country arithmetic with problems involving farm crops, the dairy, poultry, the measurement of grain in bins, drainage, fencing, and sales of produce. Now when a farmer, unable to calculate the number of tons of hay in a stack that he wished to buy, found his son able to cope with the problem by means of a new rule, the father was filled with a new respect for the school as an institution with a direct and useful relative to life as he knew it.
