The bishop will arrive from San Francisco, probably this afternoon and will be the guest of the local church during the conference.

Many Will Attend Conference In addition to the prominent churchmen from other states, practically all of the Methodist ministers of the state will be in attendance.

Tomorrow evening at 8:30 o'clock a reception in honor of Bishop Shepard will be given.

7:30 p. m.—Lecture, "The Imminence of God"—Bishop Shepard. 8:30 p. m.—Reception to William O. Shepard, D. D. L. L. D.; address by Miss Carlota Moyer.

Special Music Arranged The Methodist church choir will provide special music at the sessions of the conference. It has been practicing on its program for several weeks past and its singing will be one of the features of the meeting.

An automobile trip over the district is one of the entertainment features that is planned for the noted visitors. This will be held Saturday afternoon, following the afternoon session of the conference.

The business year of the local church closes coincidentally with the meeting of the conference, as with all other churches in the mission. The report that Rev. E. G. Decker, of the local church, will make to the conference will be a very interesting one. Financially the report will be that all of the bills against the church have been paid and the church will start a new year without owing a cent.

Record For Year Excellent During the year just closing \$1,380 has been spent in church improvements. This is Mr. Decker's second year as pastor of the Bisbee church and at the recent quarterly conference he was unanimously invited to continue his charge of the church.

Notwithstanding the transient character of the population of this district the membership of the church has been maintained at 100. The financial showing of the church is a splendid tribute to the activity of the membership of the church and its pastor.

The conference also marks the closing of Mr. Decker's thirteenth year in the Arizona mission, during which time he has worked in churches in nearly every important town in the state.
