The recent declaration of Senator John D. Works, Republican, of California, that he would vote for neither Taft nor Roosevelt next month but support Wilson, has brought dejection to both the Republican and Progressive ranks. Having always been a strong champion of progressive politics, Senator Works has a large following in the Golden state, and his support was eagerly sought by both parties. His reasons for voting for Wilson are that "Taft was not fairly and honestly nominated," and that "Roosevelt has never until now stood openly for progressive principles."

BISBEEITE PREDICTS BULL MOOSE VICTORY

Kinney Is Exclaiming Loud and Strong That Teddy Will Get the Big Vote

J. W. Kinney returned Sunday from Phoenix, where he spent several days on business. Asked about the political alignment at the state capital, Kinney replied that it is his belief that the Bull Moose ticket will sweep the state. "I did not know the extent of the party's strength in the state until I made this trip," he admitted, but the fight is between Wilson and Roosevelt and it is going to be close but I believe that the odds are in favor of Teddy. When it comes to letting however, there are no odds. At Phoenix the betting is at even money that Roosevelt will carry Arizona.

"A strong vote taken at a theater at Phoenix resulted in a majority for Roosevelt and I believe that a theater crowd is fairly representative. At Bisbee the same show conducted a poll and the result was 69 for Wilson and 63 for Roosevelt. That is pretty close if it is representative and if Roosevelt's vote in the election is proportionate with the polls Moose victory on November 5."

Kinney was almost kidnapped by the chorus of "The Heart Breaker" at Osburn. By mistake he got on the show train and in a minute he was captured by the chorus girls. He maneuvered around until he could get hold of his hand grip and made a successful sortie for the door of the coach.

Mr. Kinney found a number of Bisbeeites and ex-Bisbeeites at the state capital. He saw Mike Cassidy, Parker L. Woodman, A. H. Gardner, United States Marshal Overlock, H. D. McVay, John Carretto and others.

BISBEE ELKS WILL HAVE DOUGLAS VISIT

Special Train Will Carry 125 "Burn the Mortgage" Boosters Saturday

Douglas will be invaded by a good sized army of Bisbeeites next Saturday evening. Word to that effect was sent to the Smelter City yesterday by the committee which has the trip in hand and the letter told of what Bisbee would do to help on the entertainment.

To obtain the special train to Douglas it has been necessary to guarantee 100 fares. Already half of that number have been obtained and it is expected the party will consist of at least 125 besides the band that will be taken along by the excursionists. It having been decided to take twenty pieces and half of the expenses outside of the railroad fare had been pledged yesterday.

Others besides Elks may take advantage of this special excursion to Douglas Saturday night if they so desire although the entertainment at the Elks' club will be for the Bisbee Elks. Those who wish to visit the smelters or make a call upon friends will be welcome to make use of the train, the railroad making a one fare for the round trip. The train will leave at 8:30 so that business men may finish their work before the time for departure. The special will return at the close of the entertainment in Douglas. Booster signs for the Burn the Mortgage Bazaar were ordered yesterday to be carried in the parade which will follow the arrival of the party in Douglas.

PATRIOTS BEGIN JOURNEY TO AID

was for a time an apprentice at the Y. M. C. A. and is well known to the members of the association. He is only twenty-one years old. He embodies the national spirit of Montenegro. When he joined the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium class he explained that he wanted to put himself in physical condition. For the wrongs of centuries the Serbs, Montenegrans and other Balkan states have suffered at the hands of the Turks. "Steve" will contribute his quota of blood, if need be to "get even."

Lee Javonovich, one of the most prominent members of the local Slav colony, carried the American flag in the parade and proudly he carried it. The Javonovich family is represented in the company of fighting men by Steve and Tom Javonovich, cousins of Lee.

Four women, wives of volunteers in the party, accompanied the company in the capacity of nurses. There were tears in their eyes during the great demonstration of patriotism at the depot but tears when they come from a woman's eyes are hard to battle wounds and for the little company of Steve, Montenegrans and Serbians, there will be no "lack of woman's nursing or heart's of woman's tears."

The soldiers all wore uniforms of corduroy, with Norfolk jackets, and buckskin shoes and on their coat lapels wore badges with the legend, "Fight for Liberty" on them. The "finance committee" of which a large share of the credit for the aid that is being extended the native land is due, is composed of Lee Sugich, Lazar Brajovich, Bogor Borobich, L. R. Poscoe, Mike Popovich, Tom Vukunovich, R. Cerovich, Dave Andovich and Steve Perovich, the latter of Douglas. The last five accompanied the volunteers and have charge of the company until a commander is assigned.

The special train that left Bisbee yesterday was not an excursion back to the old country, for many of them will never again see either their old or their new home. They go direct to the frontier of the Balkans. Twenty or more already have gone but they will visit their homes before joining the army.

The demonstration at the depot was truly a manifestation of sympathy. Every window of the Copper Queen warehouse, four stories high, was filled with people and the more eager climbed on top of box cars on the side tracks at the depot and on top of the depot.

The volunteers' appreciation of this spirit of sympathy on the part of the Americans is voiced by L. R. Rogee, a prominent Serbian-American, who was appointed a committee of one to tender, through The Review, their thanks and appreciation of their sympathy and aid.

Train Starts Amid Cheering

At three o'clock the conductor called "all aboard" and hands were silently clasped, kisses were hastily given. The Calumet & Arizona band struck up "America" and the crowd let go a thunderous cheer.

"My native country thee—Land of the noble free, My native land."

Whether the nationality or nativity of thousands of cheering people the music of the band expressed the patriotic conception of The Fatherland.
