

TREASURER HICKS REPORT OF FUNDS

County Comptroller Shows He Has Collected \$5,000 in Delinquent Taxes for October

MONEY IS PLENTIFUL

TOMBSTONE, Nov. 8.—County Treasurer Charles W. Hicks has filed with the clerk of the board of supervisors his report on the condition of the county treasury for the month of October, and the same is indeed a very interesting document, and goes to show that Treasurer Hicks is wasting no time collecting delinquent taxes due Cochise county for several years past, that official having collected nearly \$5,000 from that source during the past month.

The report shows the county strong box to be in an excellent condition, and during the last month a total of \$120,729.57 was handled in that department of the county government. On the first of last month there was a cash balance on hand of \$99,777.53. While the receipts during that period amounted to \$21,562.06, the same being made up principally of the following items:—

Recorder O. E. Murphy, fees \$75.10.
Justice and constable fees \$751.00.
Sheriff Wheeler, fees and license \$3,038.90.

The disbursements for the month of October amounted to \$28,943.57, showing that the amount of \$6,994.45 was expended over the total of receipts for the same period. Principal among the disbursements were the following items:—

County road warrants paid, \$2,491.07.

School superintendent expense warrants paid \$730.92.

The Douglas school district has the largest balance in the school bond and interest fund of any district in the county, the same amounting to \$22,591.33, the Bisbee school district is second with a balance of \$4,226.76, while the districts of Tombstone, Wilcox and Naco come next, each having a balance of one thousand dollars and a little over.

The report further shows that Judge M. C. High of Bisbee leads all other justices of the peace in the county, he having turned into the county treasury the sum of \$283.65 as fines and fees collected by him during the last month.

SALVATION ARMY CONGRESS

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 8.—The annual Salvation Army congress for the Northwest opened in this city today with an attendance of nearly 200 officers of the organization from points in Wisconsin, Minnesota, northern Michigan and North and South Dakota. The congress will last about one week and will be devoted principally to the consideration of plans for the further extension of the Salvation Army work in the Northwest.

CASE AGAINST ARMY OFFICERS DISMISSED

It Is Believed Arrests of Soldiers at Douglas Was for Moral Influence

After all of the fuss and the feathers and the hue and the cry attending the arrest of Lieutenants Holderness and Howard, of the Ninth cavalry, and Mexican Consul Cuesta, on the charge of trespassing and assault with a deadly weapon when the Hotel Mexicano, at Douglas, was searched, the case has been dismissed. The action was taken by motion of County Attorney Gilmore.

While it is said that the attorneys representing the case prepared to show that the order for the search came from the war department at Washington, no evidence was introduced. Thus ends a case that at one time threatened the peaceable relations between officials of the state of Arizona and the United States.

Arrests for Moral Influence
Soon after the search of the hotel the Review printed the government's side of the matter, in the form of an interview with United States Attorney Morrison and several days later Sheriff Wheeler came back, giving his side of the case and intimating that the attorney had made a conciliatory termination of the cases impossible. It was generally believed here, however, that the arrests were made for the moral effect and the dismissal of the cases was not a surprise.

One of the attorneys representing the hotel owner has issued a statement directed at the county attorney. The statement also said the United States attorney J. E. Morrison refused in open court to apologize for the violation of the constitution of the United States by the army officers.

REPUTATION OF JUDGE HIGH TRAVELS TO EAST

Oklahoma Asks Bisbee Justice of the Peace for His Program for Decisions

The reputation of Judge High, of the police court and justice of the peace, in "matters of simple justice" extends beyond the borders of Arizona, even unto the Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The Interstate Press Bureau has been reading of Judge High's Solomon-like disposition of certain kinds of cases in which justice was tempered with mercy and sometimes submerged in "the milk of human kindness" and they have written the local judge asking for an extended statement of his ideas and opinions in matters of simple justice. The letter reads in part as follows:

Letter Full of Interest
"We have read with interest of your action in the case of a woman being discharged after she had kissed constable and the case wherein a woman seeking a divorce was satisfied."

"We should like to have you write us your opinion in matters of simple justice that have come before you or what may be used in an interview on your ideas in cases like those referred to."

The bureau also asks for pictures of the justice, to be used in an illustrated story for metropolitan newspapers.
Judge Too Modest to Reply
Had the judge, who is very modest, known of the publicity that was to follow his novel disposition of the case of the Cherokee Indian woman or of the woman who would have a divorce but was counseled to return to her husband, he probably would have been tempted to hold a secret session of court, but there is something fresh and interesting about pure, undiluted justice of the kind that Solomon used that has a peculiar appeal in these days of legal technicalities.
