CAMPA IS IN JAIL ENEMY ON HONEYMOON

Serrano, as Prefect of Altar, Defended Town Against Rebel Who Attacked

TUCSON, Dec. 10.—While Gen. Emilio Campa, rebel commander, paces his cell in the Pima county jail, facing the unpleasant possibility that the United States may turn him over to the Mexican government in whose hands his fate is uncertain, Eugenio P. Serrano, former prefect of Altar, and the defender of that town in battle against Campa, is enjoying his honeymoon in Tucson with all the freedom from care that special position and wealth can bring.

Serrano, as prefect of his district, commanded the federal troops which defended the town of Altar against the rebels in the pitched battle fought several months ago. Though greatly outnumbered by the rebels, the federals put up a stubborn fight for hours, losing a number of their men in so doing.

At one time when it looked as though the rebels were certain of victory, a party of five women, dreading the possible consequences should the rebels overpower the town's defenders, fled in an automobile. One of them was Mrs. Teresa Escalante, now in Tucson as Serrano's bride.

Becoming confused in the sudden flight, the party got lost on the desert and wandered about in the automobile for days, seeking a place of safety. Finally, through sheer accident, they reached a railroad and a small town. It was Gila Bend, Ariz., west of Maricopa on the Southern Pacific. They then came to Tucson and remained here until Campa and his men had fled into the United States and surrendered.
