The deaths numbered nineteen for November and the births were twenty-nine. In the deaths there were nine females and ten males and in the births, sixteen females and thirteen males.

STATE IS RECEIVING ANNUAL TAX MONEY

Five Counties of State Turn in Nearly \$500,000 During the Last Week

In the last week State Treasurer Johnson at Phoenix has received from five of the counties of the state, tax and collections amounting to \$465,905.24. This while the greater part of the taxes for 1912 is really the remittances from those counties for the quarter ending December 31, 1912.

As soon as these amounts were received Treasurer Johnson issued a call for all outstanding state warrants which had been endorsed "no funds," in order to stay the further growth of the interest due on them. There are more than \$250,000 of these warrants outstanding and they will now be paid with their legal interest as fast as they are received at the office.
