

# JACK TAYLOR IS BELIEVED DEAD

### Former Mayor of Bisbee Is Thought to Have Wandered to Death While Mentally Unbalanced

#### SEARCH IS UNAVAILING

Allen R. English, of Tombstone has forwarded to the Review a letter he has received from Mogolton, New Mexico, making inquiry of John S. Taylor, formerly Mayor of Bisbee and at one time a prominent local politician. This letter was written by F. A. Warden, who states that Taylor left Mogolton on February first and has not been heard of since. He says Taylor had been drinking for a month and was mentally unbalanced. Officers and possees hunted for days, but no trace of him could be found.

Mr. Gordon continues his letter as follows: "Thinking he might have some business in or around Bisbee and may have gone there, I wish you would ask the Masonic lodge, of which he was a member at Bisbee, to try and help locate him, if in that part of the country. Many think he is dead; others that he has simply wandered away."

# Mines And Markets

## WORK BEGINS ON HIGGINS

### Leasers Put Engineers at Work Today to Determine All Points Relating to Property

#### SUCCESS IS PREDICTED

Surveyors will this morning commence a systematic plan of campaign on the Higgins for the purpose of determining the extent and the general bearing of all workings on this property, preliminary to the conclusion of the plan of development that James Letson and associates will carry out under the lease they secured last week, announcement of which was made in the Review of last Sunday.

It is known that previous Higgins workings demonstrated much of value, particularly in connection with any plan that might be made for further work on the property. Until this time it has been known to but few just what was accomplished on the Higgins. Under the terms of the lease the leasers have access to all old records and to all workings, with privilege to conduct whatever line of investigation they may deem desirable.

With this wide open access to the property, it is the purpose of the leasers to determine fully what they have in an entirely systematic and scientific manner. They will then be in a position to go ahead along thoroughly informed lines. The preliminary engineering and survey work is to be carried out for them by the engineering firm of Smith and Zelsmer, with whom contract has been entered into and by whom work will be commenced this morning.

There are few mining men in the district who have not contended in the light of developments of the last several years that the Higgins would have made good in its earlier career had its main working shaft been located at the back of the property instead of on the point. It is certainly true that along the Copper Queen line there are showings warranting the belief that the Higgins has equally as good ground as some of the very rich adjacent territory from which the Queen has mined some of its best paying ore.

All this has been looked into very thoroughly by Mr. Letson and his associates, with result that they are now satisfied to go ahead with expenditure of money which they have contracted in order to determine with the instruments of science the correctness of the views they have arrived at from their cursory, but none the less experienced, inspection of the property at various times since its closing down several years ago. General comment in the district on the taking up of the old property has been marked since the announcement made on Sunday much interest being demonstrated. It is the belief with their practical mining knowledge and the assistance of the well known general trend of the ore along the Higgins line, together with the technical and general information they are now obtaining through the retention of competent engineering services, the leasers will be in position to make a decided success with the Higgins and that within six months they will be able to enter the shipping class, if they so desire in preference to blocking out ore for the future.

cost payable out of an adequate sinking fund."

Of a reduction of the salary roll of the government, amounting to about \$5,500,000 annually, two-thirds, the president declared, would be saved by adopting his scheme to classify what are now presidential appointments. Almost \$3,000,000 annually could be kept in government coffers through postoffice department changes. The sum of \$2,500,000 would be cut from the payroll Mr. Taft continued. If there were a complete executive reclassification of civil service employees. Under this head the president wrote:

"In the present situation many men at the bottom are receiving larger salaries than would be obtained for similar work in outside employment, whereas men in higher positions carrying great responsibility and the success of whose performance depends on training and life experience are inadequately paid. ## SAGINAW IS GOOD DEAL

### Both Sides Evidently Pleased with Rate of Transfer Arranged with Calumet and Arizona

#### IS VALUABLE GROUND

Advance in bid and price for Saginaw yesterday reflected more than satisfaction on the part of holders with the exchange basis announced in Saginaw official circular as that agreed upon for transfer of Saginaw to Calumet and Arizona.

Evidently it was not generally expected in trading circles that the exchange rate would be as liberal as the official announcement has determined. opinion it would enable the government to pay higher salaries to those of whom experience, training and initiative are required and make the saving of \$2,000,000."

Elimination of waste in the distribution of public documents; reduction of the number of United States assay offices and possibly the number of mines and their consolidation into one, are other recommendations.

"With much hesitation," the president recommends "the organization of a budget committee of congress. It should act as a final clearing house through which all the recommendations of committees having to do with revenues and expenditures would pass before they take the form of bills.

"The special reason I have for urging this committee," wrote the president, "is that at present the administration is seriously handicapped by not being able to take up proposals for constructive measures affecting any particular department with any one body or committee which will undertake to consider them in all their phases."

Going further the president suggested that appropriations should be in the following classes:

To cover overhead and operating cost.

For upkeep of property.

For fixed charges including sinking fund.

For permanent improvements.

Concluding he says, "The government is not only in the position of having gone along for a century without a budget, but what is at this time even more to the point, it has not the organic means either for preparing or for considering one. I am recommending that congress make some organic provision whereby the administrative and legislative branches may co-ordinate their efforts in the development of the future activities of the government as well as for the determination of the expenditures needed for the current transaction of its business."

## OFFICER PREVENTS WOMAN FROM SUICIDE

### Took Carbolic Acid When Arrested—Face Burned—Is Second Attempt

A woman known as "Vergie" resident of the red light district attempted to commit suicide early yesterday morning by taking carbolic acid.

According to Officer Kempton, the woman was disturbing the peace and he arrested her. She asked if she might go into her room and get her coat. This she was allowed to do. Kempton, suspecting that she might try to get away, followed her. The moment she stepped through the door she seized a small bottle of carbolic acid standing on the dressing table and attempted to swallow the contents. Kempton seized her hand and wrenched the bottle away, but just before some of the liquid had spilled on her face, burning her. In the scuffle some of the acid was poured on Kempton's hand, burning it. This is the second time that the woman has attempted to commit suicide. About two months ago she tried to end her life in the same way and was at the time prevented by Officer Kempton. She was taken to the county jail and lodged on a charge of disturbing the peace.

### Old Egyptian Wall Painting.

Probably the earliest wall paintings are the ancient Egyptian. They employed a distemper containing dissolved gum, and their principal pigments were white chalk, a vegetable yellow, ochres, Ethiopian cinnabar, blue powdered glass stained with copper and charcoal black. Their drawing was technically skillful, and, as in the case with the modern decorator, their coloring was purely decorative and their designs fanciful and extravagant.

### His Mother.
