## GRAHAM DRIVES ARTESIAN WELL

### Or, Rather He Secures Passage of Bill Through the House to Sink One in the Sulphur Valley

#### ROBERTS IS OPPOSED

The Arizona Republican thus tells of the success of Representative Graham in passing the measure through the lower house of the legislature on Friday last, making an appropriation for sinking an artesian well in the Sulphur Spring valley in this county.

"The house yesterday afternoon had a little session in which some of the members seemed to delight in taking a fall out of Senator Roberts of Cochise, who is reputed to be the watchdog of the treasury in the legislature. Some time ago there was a hearing before the appropriations committee on the need of the university for money to conduct its experimental service, especially with regard to the survey for water resources. There is one member of the house by the name of Billy Reid who is not disposed to wait until the university experts can reach a particular section of the state. This member is Graham of Cochise, better known as the bulldog of the house, because of his tenacity. Yesterday in the consideration of his bill providing for an appropriation of \$3999 to be used in sinking a well on a section of school land in Sulphur Springs valley, it was contended by Mr. Graham that the increase of value of that section by reason of the discovery of water in sufficient quantities to irrigate which will increase the taxable value of Cochise so much that the state will reap more than the actual expense in taxes per year.

"The bill was before the committee of the whole, and that committee decided first to throw the bill out, but Billy Reid on and his bill with him until a decision was reached to at least discuss the matter. This was not enough because it looked for a while as if the committee of the whole would also throw the bill out, but still Mr. Graham held on. Then followed a sur-

rough discussion of the bill on its merits. "Kerr stated that Roberts had said in the committee on appropriations meeting that wells had been sunk all over the Sulphur Springs valley with- out results, and that they had been abandoned and that these wells had been sunk to depth that would demonstrate if water was there or not and no geologic results had been obtained.

"Kelton immediately said the senator was mistaken, and pleaded for the passage of the bill. Whipple of Greenlee seemed to evidence a belief in a pork barrel for he said he would not vote for the bill because it did not contain a provision so that a well could be sunk on every similar section in the state, and there was no chance for Greenlee to get in on it. Saxon drew attention to the fact that the incoming farmer was possibly driving the range man before him, which might account for the opposition to the bill from some quarters. Finally the bill, however, prevailed with a few amendments. In the work of the bill the two members from Pima, Crofoot and Kirke T. Moore assisted largely in getting amendments into the bill that removed the objections of many of the members so that the bill was finally sent on its way, with Graham rejoicing."

#### FOR CHEAPER ALUMINUM

Alfred H. Cowles, who, with his brother was the pioneer 25 years ago in production of cheap aluminum, read a paper recently before a joint meeting of all chemical societies of New York in which he described a process whereby oxide of aluminum can be produced directly from clay or potash feldspar, using salt and steam, and with production of muriatic acid and a material which, on treatment with lime, combines the alumina and potash of soda to be recovered. The residue left after removal of the products was shown to be suited for great use in the glass and cement industry.

He stated: "This general process opens the way to secure alumina cheaply or as a by-product in conjunction with these other products of great consumption in the industrial world. There is required 1.2 pounds of aluminum oxide or alumina to produce one pound of aluminum. The weight of alumina costs, by present methods, about seven cents a pound, and is the heaviest item of cost in production of the pure metal. By a general introduction of this process we may hope to see the cost of metal aluminum reduced four or five cents per pound, and eventually it will almost supplant copper except in manufacture of generators and motors.

He also explained that muriatic acid, commonly called hydrochloric acid, would come into great use in the production of potash salts and phosphoric acid from potash feldspar and Florida phosphate rock and showed that these minerals, mixed in certain proportions with a small definite amount of acid added thereto, would produce a fertilizer inasmuch as it involves utilization of potash in the feldspar.

His paper closed with the following statement: "Gentlemen, the soap industry is founded on the use of alkali. I have pointed out to you the possibilities of the fertilizer, the cement and the glass industries, all as being future contributors to the cheap production of alumina for production of cheap aluminum, which must come with expansion of the use of electricity, to furnish power for electrification of our railroads and other industrial uses."

**New Material for Floors.** They are making the floors of big office buildings in Germany of a mixture of magnesium chloride, pulverized magnesia and sawdust, laid from two to four inches thick. General Robert P. Skinner reports from Hamburg that such floors are waterproof, almost fireproof, crack free, warm under foot, elastic, sound proof and cheaper than pine flooring, tiles or stone.

## SALOON MEN ARE ASSISTING

### Will Pay for Services of Special Officers Appointed to Enforce "Move on" Orders of Health Officers

#### INCREASE IN PEOPLE COMPLAINTS WELCOME

For the purpose of carrying into enforcement the orders of city and county health officials that there shall be no congregating or loitering in any places during the present quarantine regulations, the saloon men of the city yesterday afternoon volunteered to pay for the services of three special officers to enforce the order so long as necessary.

Besides this, signs will be posted instructing customers to make their purchases and not linger at or near the bar. Further than this they agreed to have no lighted stoves in their place the warmth being an inducement to crowds to remain.

As special officers for the saloon work, Marshal Watkins last night appointed and swore in Messrs. Driver, Keating and King. He will add to these a fourth man today. Last night he had not decided who would be chosen.

Due to the "move on" order effective at bars, there were more people in the streets of the city Sunday than noted in a long time, and for a Monday the crowds in the street yesterday were record breakers. With no place to congregate inside public buildings, the crowds seek the streets and sidewalks and these days are giving a better idea of the large number of people moving about Bisbee daily than ordinarily obtainable.

Expressions of surprise were current Sunday generally among observers who thought they had something of a line on Bisbee population but were obliged to admit they had been figuring far short, particularly as to the extent of increase in American population during the last several months.

## GLAD TO SEE GOOD WEATHER BACK AGAIN

### Fire Laddies Return to Outside Drill and Cleaning Up Activities with Avidity

Fire Chief Norton said yesterday that the change in weather was acceptable in no quarter with more favor than right in his department. "While water is a fine thing, the amount that has been about on the ground in the city the last several weeks has been a source of dread with us for the reason that in the event of fire the department would not have expected to make anything like good time through the slush, with the possibility of becoming stalled on any of the many steep hillsides that have been sticky and slippery with mud and water.

"Besides this feature there has been the necessity of keeping equipment inside instead of setting in the usual daily exercise and practice work. We are delighted with the change in weather conditions and hope it is here to stay."

#### MONTHLY PAY OF CITY EMPLOYEES

"Will the ghost walk? how about it?" has been a not uncommon line of mental activity among city employees during the several days since the health authorities put the ban on public meetings, which quite incidentally reaches the city council's first meeting of the month, a meeting at which the law provides for the payment of salaries and bills.

City Clerk Butler, always alert and ready with the business of his department, is on the job with a complete file of city accounts ready for submission to the council, but last night was unable to say whether there would be a meeting of the council tonight to act on the schedule or not. The council itself is no better informed than the clerk. Should the ban on public meetings be raised today, there would be no trouble, but there is no likelihood of its coming up for several days yet. The council cannot hold a regular meeting except that it is open to the public which has the right to presence.

It was considered settled last night, however, that a meeting of the members of the council would be called and promptly adjourned, the law thus being conformed with. After this the council can hold an informal session behind closed doors and audit the accounts, pass upon them and order payment. This is the course that is at present expected, and in that event city employees will be about tomorrow with their pay checks as usual, while merchants and others with accounts against the city for supplies will receive their checks promptly.

## PUBLIC HELPS IN SANITATION

### Enforcement of New Ordinance Being Given Assistance -- Officers Are Kept Busy.

#### MAKING USE OF DARKENED TIME

Under the new city ordinance covering improved sanitation in the city, the office of City Marshal Watkins was busy yesterday directing orders for cleaning up and going into complaints received. Of the latter there were a number and it is expected that there will be more. The police department is not averse to these, so long as founded on fact, for they are an assistance to the officers in locating unlawful conditions on properties about the city and is presenting the matter to those responsible. So if you know of unsanitary conditions in your neighborhood that should be remedied, let the marshal's office know and the matter will be taken up, if it comes within the scope of the new ordinance.

The principal immediate feature being given attention by the city officials is the matter of receptacles in all yards for slops and refuse. A stout galvanized can with covering is the proper thing—something that will stand the battering that cannot be done along with the garbage man's handling of the receptacle. The latter must be provided and slops and refuse must go in them instead of on the ground. Also they must be placed so as to be convenient for the garbage collector.

Manure piles in yards must go. The health department is very likely to take up this feature in connection with the fact that it is from such refuse that spinal meningitis is pretty generally conceded by physicians to emanate. At least the manure pile is a choice breeding place for the meningitis microbes, which are carried from there by the flies which are always found to infest such heaps and also to have breeding places there. On the Pacific coast last summer and fall during the prevalence of infantile paralysis which is in reality a form of spinal meningitis, many livery stables in not a few cities, were closed up, fumigated and kept free from stock during prevalence of the trouble. The livery stable is conceded a fine breeding place for meningitis and where entrances open on main traveled streets is particularly dangerous. Thorough antiseptic spraying and other precautions are necessary along with cleaning of the places daily to insure a minimum of safety.

It is understood the authorities in the next few days will bring about a general cleaning up of manure heaps, which must go into closed and fly proof receptacles. It is also probable that there will be other clauses added to the present ordinance early date that will abate stock harboring nuisances, including cows and horses on city lots, there being a movement to this end now underway.

General inclination of the public is gauged by the contact had yesterday under the new ordinance, is to do all possible to help with the improved sanitary conditions that are desired and being worked for in the city. Such acceptance of the situation is highly gratifying to the authorities and reflects large credit upon the public of the community. To many members of which compliance is not at together easy.


