BISBEE SAVINGS ARE IN THE LEAD

Postal Banking Department of Local Office Ahead in Deposits of Any Other Town of Same Size in the Country

The postal savings bank receipts of the Bisbee post office have been compiled and show that the money turned into the savings bank department here represents greater per capita than in any other city of its size in the country for the two years, just closed, in which the government has conducted the savings bank system.

During the two years Bisbeeites deposited \$284,961, represented in 1474 accounts. A total of 2866 deposits were made. Besides being the highest per centage per capita the total deposits sets a record for second class post offices.

"From the first," said Postmaster Cassidy yesterday, "there was no doubt of the success of the postal savings bank here, but the splendid record made for Bisbee is even better than we expected. The system was popular from the beginning and the accounts here not only represent every nationality but every line of business in the district. It is thoroughly cosmopolitan and all classes have helped to make the record for a second class office."

The government pays 2 per cent on postal deposits and not more than \$100 can be deposited by any single person at a time. In addition to this the total deposit of one person cannot be greater than \$500. It is the opinion of many postmasters that, were these restrictions removed, the deposits would greatly increase. To this end the present congress will be petitioned to remove the restrictions from both the single and aggregate deposit and if this cannot be secured an effort will be made to have present figures increased.

Postmaster Cassidy deserves much credit for the phenomenal success of the local branch of the postal savings system. When establishment was first authorized he made a personal canvass of the district explaining the plan. By hard work he managed to get in deposits of over \$1000 in the first few days of operation. Since that time each month has shown increase over the previous month.

Wallace he has been making a 3 mile run every morning, has been getting in good work at hand ball and has mauled a quartette of sparring partners every day. These trouts have been at the Y. M. C. A. with Van Lewis, Barnes, Callahan and Sully Van. Freeman has been in partial number of bouts at the Y. M. C. A. but the fast work of the last ten days has put him in great shape. His wind is perfect and with his sparring partners he has shown that he can easily go 20 rounds without tiring.

Yesterday a letter was received by Freeman from the promoters announcing that they wished to postpone the match one week, until May 11. Freeman has already lost ten days in training and will not accept these terms. There is some chance that the promoters, who have made no provision for time lost by Freeman, will still keep to their original guarantee, but unless this is done Freeman will accept no later date.

The calling off of the fight will be a disappointment to the fight fans in Bisbee, a large number of whom had planned making the trip to Douglas to witness the match.
