

## WILL HAVE TO RECONSTRUCT

**Bisbee-Douglas Link of State Highway Calls for Much Work—Probable That It Will Go Until Next Year**

Little repair work and practically nothing in the way of permanent repairs to the Bisbee-Douglas link of the State highway may be expected this year. It is admitted that this highway was never properly built and will have to be to a large extent reconstructed. That will probably let go for another year as it will cost several thousand dollars. These are the advices that have reached Secretary Joe Gray of the Commercial club in reply to a letter written to State Engineer Cobb on the subject of putting that link of the highway in condition.

Gray wrote to the state engineer on May 6 calling his attention to the condition of the road between here and Douglas and inclosing complaints which the club had received. He also took up the matter of starting work on the Fairbank bridge and on the state highway out of Bisbee toward that bridge. Since his letter work has been begun at Fairbank and the letter of the state engineer says nothing as to starting the highway work in question.

Relative to the Bisbee-Douglas road Mr. Cobb says that he does not think it advisable to spend any money in temporary repairs and believes the one man now working there can keep it in fair condition until such time as funds are available for reconstruction and proper draining which would cost several thousand dollars. He believes it best to devote all of this year's appropriation to construction work and take care of reconstruction out of next year's appropriation.

Mr. Cobb continues that he recognizes that there will be considerable adverse criticism to this policy but he is satisfied that he is doing the proper thing.

The Commercial Club has now had the matter up with both the board of supervisors and the state engineer. What its future course will be is yet to be determined.
